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

Splashes of color adorn the walls of downtown San Jose, where larger-than-life murals are just one way to learn about the vibrant communities that shape this historic city. While San Jose may be known as a modern hub of innovation, its cultural heritage is just as meaningful.

From the tantalizing flavors found in Japantown to the lively spots of Little Italy, every neighborhood has a tale to tell. cardamom, and bay leaf. In the San Francisco Bay Area, Veso blends organic fruit and whole spices with California white wines, and Ortolan Rosolio distills 30 varieties of heirloom roses to create a fragrant, ambercolored aperitif. L'Apéro les Trois crafts its

products with California fruits and nuts-black mission figs, Blenheim apricots, green walnuts, Meyer lemons, and homestead quince. The orchardfresh ingredients are grown within five miles of the Winters tasting room, then infused into fortified wines from neighboring Berryessa Gap Vineyards.

"We're making the old styles of aperitifs, but with our fruits," Brennan says.

The fusion of old and new results in an aperitif that's colorful, refreshing to drink, and has a moderately low alcohol content of 15 to 16 percent, equivalent to a Napa Valley Cabernet Sauvignon.

In the L'Apéro les Trois tasting room, patrons linger over aperitif flights and appetizers while a piano pipes out dinner jazz.


"People come in here and say it's like being in France," Brennan says. "Having an aperitif lends itself to sharing time with family and friends. It speaks to our appetite for slowing down."

hen you sit down to have an aperitif, you're participating in history. "It's a way to hit 'pause' before the evening meal," says Georgeanne Brennan, cookbook author and coowner of L'Apéro les Trois aperitifs, based in Winters. "Think of it as a transition, a moment in time that separates the workday from the pleasures of the table.

While the fizzy orange Aperol Spritz is Instagram's favorite aperitif, it's just one splash in a sea of predinner spirits.

California producers make aperitifs in a range of flavors and colors: Ventura Spirits crafts Amaro Angeleno bitter liqueur with Valencia orange peels, then mixes it with soda water and grapefruit to produce its Angeleno Spritz, packaged in colorful cans. Napa-based Mommenpop makes aperitifs dominated by California citrus-Meyer lemons, blood oranges, and ruby grapefruits. Sonoma's Jardesca infuses aperitifs with botanicals like pink peppercorn, ginger,

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

CALIFORNIA RAISES THE BAR WITH EARTH-FRIENDLY VINEYARDS, VINTAGES, AND TOURS

ustainable winemaking is more than a trend-it's an ever-growing expectation in the United States, the world's fourth-largest wine-producing country. In California, the nation's largest wine-producing state, more than 55 percent of all vineyards are certified as sustainable. From grape to glass, forward-thinking growers and vintners are using innovative methods to create sustainable, biodynamic, and organic wines. Check out their eco-friendly techniques and taste the fruits of their labor on vineyard tours that showcase the Golden State's sustainability in action.

TOUR THE FIELDS

Hop into a six-person chauffeured cart to tour the vines at Honig Winery in Napa Valley. On the guided eco-tour, you'll learn how bees, bluebirds, owls, sheep, and even golden retrievers play a role in Honig's winegrowing practices, and how the winery operates entirely on solar power.

Learn more about how animals aid in sustainable viticulture on a tractor tram ride through Benziger Family Winery Sonoma Mountain Estate vineyards, where cattle provide organic manure.

Ponte Winery, the first vineyard in the Temecula Valley to achieve a Certified California Sustainable Winegrower designation, loads passengers into an electric cart for a ranch tour and tasting. Amid rows of vines, your guide pours wine straight from a tank or cask.

TAKE A HIKE


In Paso Robles, Tablas Creek Vineyard offers a daily guided trek through the grapevines. As you walk, you'll see a herd of sheep and alpacas tilling and fertilizing the soil. For more grapeto-glass walking tours, visit Vino Noceto Winery in Plymouth (Amador County), Bokisch Vineyards in Lodi, or Medlock Ames in Healdsburg.

TASTE OUTSIDE THE BOX



6 Fabulous Film Locations in California

VETERAN LOCATION SCOUT LORI BALTON HAS WORKED WITH SOME OF THE TOP DIRECTORS ON THE PLANET AND KNOWS THE GOLDEN STATE INSIDE AND OUT

alton, who lives in Venice, California, will scour the globe to find the ideal filming location. This year, she'll travel to Scotland, Saudi Arabia, Spain, the Baltic states, and Namibia, but the perfect spot is often much closer to home. "What's unique about this state is its diversity," she says. "If you take a short trip in any direction, you'll see a whole different environment. It's interesting how often I go someplace across the globe and think, 'This place feels like that place in California."

Balton's career requires an encyclopedic knowledge of geographical locations plus strong story visualization skills. "Much of this work entails being able to interpret the script," she says. "In a feature film, the camera moves and the actors move through the location. I have to think about how the location is supposed to work for the movie, and how the characters are supposed to move through the frame."

Subtlety matters too. "The location should be seamless, almost unnoticeable. You don't want the location to jump out and jolt the viewer out of the movie-watching trance they're immersed in."

Balton has worked with a who's who of A-list

directors-Rob Reiner, Ava DuVernay, Martin Scorsese, Steven Spielberg, and more—but she's quick to give credit to the unsung California locals who help her do her job.

"FLICS [Film Liaisons in California Statewide] is the statewide association, and they've been helping filmmakers for decades," she says. "They might be people who work for the local chamber of commerce or tourism authority, people who really know their towns. I tell them what I'm looking for, and they make suggestions in their area. If we decide to film in their region, they act as liaisons with the community."

Balton has received five California on Location Awards (COLAs) for her work in films including Once Upon a Time in Hollywood and The Majestic. In 2013, she became the first location professional to be invited to join the Academy of Motion Pictures Arts and Sciences.

Here are a few of her favorite film locations in the Golden State:

A WRINKLE IN TIME (2018)

LOCATION: HUMBOLDT COUNTY REDWOODS

"We had so much fun up there, just walking among those giant trees. Thinking about how big and old those redwoods are makes you feel small and insignificant. It was a wonderful experience-'forest bathing' before I knew the term. I also scouted on the Lost Coast at the Candelabra Redwoods near Usal Beach Campground. The shapes of those trees are amazing—they really look like candelabras. It was too difficult and expensive to bring an entire film crew, but any hiker could go see them."

WAR FOR THE PLANET OF THE **APES (2017)**

LOCATION: DEATH VALLEY

"With all my years of living in and scouting California, I had never made it to Death Valley. It's a desolate, weird, beautiful place. When I was scouting, I noticed something on the ground. Taking a closer look, I realized someone had cracked an egg, which had fried. The next day I drove out to see the sunrise at Zabriskie Point, and at 5 a.m. there was already a crowd. Everybody was lined up to watch the sunrise. It was like church—such a beautiful, communal moment."

SEABISCUIT (2003)

LOCATIONS: SANTA ANITA RACETRACK, HEMET STOCK FARM. SANTA YNEZ VALLEY

"It's my favorite movie for a variety of reasons. First, it's a great movie. I just saw it recently and it really holds up. Secondly, my daughter was on spring break during

the week I had to drive around California to scout fairgrounds. She was in fourth grade and learning about California in social studies, and she had been riding horses since she was five. We had a great adventure together. It was the perfect blend of family time and working on a great movie, which doesn't happen often."

MEMOIRS OF A GEISHA (2005)

LOCATION: RUSSIAN RIVER, MENDOCINO COUNTY

"I was scouting for a lyrical scene in which the characters are rinsing out ribbons of colorful silk fabric in the river. I was gliding along in a kayak at dawn with the film commissioner and a couple kayak guides. The sun was just starting to come up, and a mist was hovering over the water. There was this amazing stillness that was magical."



(2002)

LOCATION: BOMBAY BEACH, SALTON SEA

"It was one of the first movies D.J. Caruso directed, and I was scouting sketchy houses and abandoned trailers. At that time Bombay Beach still had remains sinking into the salt—an old bus, abandoned buildings. In the last 20 years, a lot of new life has been breathed into that area, but I liked it the way it was back then. I like faded elegance and

things that have a layered patina-decrepit and aged, with a story to tell."


THE MAJESTIC (2001)

LOCATION: FERNDALE

"I scouted all over Northern California, and we ended up filming in Ferndale. We ended up building the movie theater that is shown in the film, but I found the right street that had the right look, the right kind of architecture. The street had an empty lot where we could build the movie theater façade."

Deep Thoughts at Séc-he

TRAVEL WRITER KATRINA HUNT ARRIVED AT THE AGUA CALIENTE SPA HOPING FOR A REJUVENATING MUD WRAP; SHE LEFT WITH A NEW CULTURAL APPRECIATION

riginally I went to Greater Palm Springs to enjoy one of the specialties of the desert: chilling out in one of its world-class spas. But I found more than that at the Spa at Séc-he, opened in 2023 by the Agua Caliente Band of Cahuilla Indians. The downtown Palm Springs spa is located above the tribal lands' true "agua caliente"—magnesium-rich hot springs that shoot up from 8,000 feet below the earth's surface.

I arrived with a basic day-spa agenda: to "take the waters" in one of the 22 private tubs, do a mud wrap, and then relax a little afterward at the pool. I was grateful, however, that I had blocked out the whole afternoon. This is a day spa where you can truly spend an entire day, and then some.

In the Cahuilla language, "séc-he" (pronounced seck-hee) means "sound of boiling water," but happily the water ranges from 95 to 105 degrees. I soaked for 15 minutes in the hot tub–style bubbles and then hopped up on a bed for a 60-minute Blue Sage Botanical Mud Wrap utilizing local ingredients. I marinated under a heated dome placed over the table, rinsed off the mud, then got

a lotion-rich massage. I felt as smooth and cool as a piece of desert turquoise.

After the treatment, I was like Alice in spa wonderland, opening doors around the 73,000-square-foot property to discover more ways to bliss out. I breathed in the therapeutic mist of halotherapy salt caves. I played Goldilocks in anti-gravity chairs, which mimic the "grounding" one gets while walking barefoot on the beach. I relaxed, meditated, and (perhaps) dozed a little.

As I explored the spa, though, I soaked up more than just little cups of cucumber water. I admired the Cahuilla artistry—from the statue of a native woman to the basket patterns on glass walls—and lingered over photos of tribal bathhouses on this very spot from the 19th century, learning that nothing is more sacred to the Cahuilla people than these healing waters.

Embracing that connection was grounding in a whole other way. I headed back to my hotel with a new appreciation for the local culture—one that runs thousands of years into the past, bubbling thousands of feet deep under the California desert.

My 5 Favorite Bites in California

CHRIS BLEIDORN. THE SAN FRANCISCO-BASED CHEF OF BIRDSONG AND BIRDBOX. SHARES HIS MUST-TRY DISHES

Picking my five favorite bites in California—and limiting myself to only five!—is no easy task. The incredible produce available to us in the Golden State is unparalleled, and the talented, thoughtful chefs in our kitchens know exactly what to do with this bounty. I may have bent the rules a bit, but if you try these dishes I'm confident you'll agree that they are truly special.



In San Diego, this dish is delicately seasoned with sesame and topped with Regiis Ova reserve caviar and a sabayon smoked with applewood. It's spectacular, and an example of a dish finely tuned over many years. We had the opportunity to collaborate with Addison's Chef William Bradley, and I can attest to the care he and his team take, not only in showcasing the ingredients they work with, but also in delivering elegant yet lighthearted service. This is one of the best restaurants in California.

BIRRIA TACO. **TUETANO TAOUERIA**

Another dish I look forward to in San Diego is Chef Priscilla Curiel's birria taco. The description alone should tell you why it's so special: The bone marrow adds a deep, roasted flavor along with a healthy dose of richness, really highlighting everything that makes for a fantastic birria taco.

LOBSTER ROLL, **NEW ENGLAND** LOBSTER CO.

I've been ordering this lobster roll in Burlingame for many years, but I recently went again with my daughter, and it was

every bit as good as I remembered. The lobsters are always harvested live from the tank, and the bread is soft yet sturdy enough to hold the filling. I've spent 20 years in California, but I grew up in New England, so there's a nostalgic element for me.

PALMIER ICE CREAM, **MONSIEUR BENJAMIN**

This ice cream in Hayes Valley is a sleeper amid all the hits on their menu. Pieces of the crunchy, buttery French pastry are folded into a rich ice cream and finished with Calvados caramel. It's a dessert that checks many boxes—texture, balanced sweetness, layers of flavor.

THREE SAN **FRANCISCO CLASSICS**


Even though my assignment was to list five bites, I'm selecting a flight of bites—these are my "must-eats." Start with the kouign-amann at b. Patisserie for breakfast, then head to Zuni Cafe for a lunch of roast chicken with bread salad, and finish the day with whatever seasonal pasta is on the menu at Cotogna. These classics are consistently executed flawlessly, proving that the best dishes are those where the chef allows the ingredients to shine.



OPTIMISTIC, PLAYFUL, COMMITTED TO CAUSES—ACTOR/MUSICIAN ZOOEY DESCHANEL IS A CALIFORNIAN THROUGH AND THROUGH

200 eV is exactly who you think she is. The actor and singer is sunny and Deschanel ine actor and singer is suming and funny. She speaks in a sing-song

cadence. And her laugh—it's a good laugh. It's deep and hearty and occasionally reaches an octave higher than her speaking voice. (Fans love her laugh: "Zooey Deschanel Laughing" has 458 million views on TikTok.) As her giggles subside, she settles into a chair in her Southern California home.

This is where Deschanel is today, and by all appearances it's a world filled with people and things she's grateful for. She's newly engaged to one-half of the Property Brothers, hers being the Jonathan Scott half. She has also just finished redecorating, following a major overhaul on the 1938 Los Angeles home she shares with her fiancé. Deschanel and Scott met in 2019 while taping an episode of James Corden's Carpool Karaoke. (Jonathan's brother Drew and Zooey's sister Emily were also on the episode.) The couple got engaged in Scotland in August 2023, and Deschanel's two children, Elsie and Charlie—from her earlier marriage to film producer Jacob Pechenik were on hand for the proposal.

Chances are, Deschanel would be happy even without all this good news. She has always cultivated an outlook that starts with looking up, toward the sky, like her dad does.

"California has such beautiful sunrises and sunsets," she says, acknowledging this is not a unique thought. But she has a family spin: "My dad takes a picture of the sunrise almost every morning. He takes Polaroids and keeps them in a book. They're all dated and everything."

Every day as she drives around Los Angeles, she's reminded of her sun-warmed youth. "Growing up, we would always take the California Incline to Pacific Coast Highway on the way home from school, and I remember there would always be a beautiful sunset."

Named after one of the characters in J.D. Salinger's 1961 book Franny and Zooey, Deschanel was born into the entertainment business: Dad is a cinematographer, and Mom is an actor. Her sister Emily is also an actor, best known for the TV series Bones. For more Hollywood associations, look no further than her high school classmates Jake Gyllenhaal and Kate Hudson.

After briefly studying at Northwestern University, Deschanel dropped out to come home to Los Angeles and join the family business. "I just knew what I wanted to do," she says. "I don't know why. I was like, I have to. I don't think I could picture doing anything else."

She pauses to actually consider it. "I think there are other professions I could have done that I would enjoy, but they're all artistic."

Back in L.A., she picked up small roles in films like Almost Famous and The Good Girl. But it was her role



in Elf starring Will Ferrell that showed the world her dual talents. Or just "talent," as she doesn't differentiate between the two.

"I think I'm both actor and musician," she says. "I consider them both to be my professions."

And she does them well. Since 2006, she's performed in the band She & Him, and it's fair to say the music is California inspired. "Very much so, yes,"

A lot of the bands who would play on the radio were from California, like the Beach Boys, the Byrds, Linda Ronstadt. Then there was Joni Mitchell and other bands with these Los Angeles and Laurel Canyon vibes, beach vibes. I remember looking out the window of the car, and the sun coming in, and having this very special feeling that is very much associated with the beauty that is California. I remember

looking at those sunsets with Dad, and just fitting in, in California."

ZOOEY THE ACTOR

In 2006, Deschanel played Sarah Jessica Parker's sidekick in the romantic comedy Failure to Launch. The next year she played in The Go-Getter, and that's where she met bandmate M. Ward, the other half of She & Him. But it was 2009's (500) Days of Summer, and the critical praise she earned for her performance opposite Joseph Gordon-Levitt, that set her up for what would be a breakthrough role: playing loveable,

perpetually optimistic Jessica Day in the TV series New Girl. The show aired from 2011 to 2018 on Fox and is now one of most popular series on Netflix.

Deschanel says her notoriously positive-meetsdorky outlook—made famous by her New Girl character Jess—is rooted in being a Californian. Which is to say, the Golden State has baked its identity into her.

"I love being a Californian and what it means," she says, praising the state's celebration of creativity, its inclusiveness, and even its geography. "I love the fact that California is this very long state, and you can take these wonderful road trips up the coast or go inland. There are so many different kinds of natural landscapes you can visit. I enjoy having a lot of scope for the imagination."

As she talks about New Girl, there's a glimpse of her serious side: "I think part of the reason why so many people can see themselves in Jess is because she's very earnest and guileless and wants to do a good job. These are qualities that are underappreciated because they're not cool, you know?"

Deschanel is thrilled with the second round of love for New Girl, which has attracted a completely new legion of fans. "The show is a celebration of her and those qualities. I think we need to celebrate people who are optimistic and positive. I like being inclusive. I like trying our best to be kind. I admire Jess for her kindness and joy and eagerness. All of these things that we try to teach our kids—those things are really important to me."





ZOOEY THE ENTREPRENEUR

Soon after becoming a parent, Deschanel started thinking hard about the availability of healthy food. "I really hate the idea that food can be elite," she says. "I don't like exclusivity. I think it's ridiculous. Why should healthy food be some exclusive thing that only people who make a certain amount of money can get, or it's only for people who drive far out of their way and have endless time on their hands? That irritated me."

So she got to work. Deschanel cofounded Lettuce Grow in 2017, a company that sells home hydroponic systems that can grow more than 200 varieties of veggie, herb, and fruit seedlings. They're perfect for the ambitious urban or suburban farmer.

Her good-food advocacy didn't stop there. In 2021, Deschanel became cofounder and chief creative officer at Merryfield. The company manages a consumer app that rewards people for purchasing food and home products from health-focused brands. Shoppers take photos of their receipts, and the app tracks their purchases much like a frequentflyer program and offers rewards for choosing high quality, better-for-you products.

"The idea behind Merryfield made so much sense to me," Deschanel says. "I'd been thinking for a while about ways to incentivize people to really think about their choices and the impact of those choices. Making more informed, positive decisions for myself and my family makes me feel good, and I know a lot of people out there feel the same way I do."

On the topic of food accessibility, she does not hold back. "The experience of having the resources to be able to afford all this amazing produce, and also being able to go to farmers' markets—it's something that shouldn't be a luxury, you know? It really should be something everybody gets to experience and everybody has access to. That was very much the inspiration behind both of those ventures."

ZOOEY AT HOME

Nearly every weekend, Deschanel and her fiancé entertain at home. Their house is colorful, unique, and joyful. It's them.

"We worked on the house very well together," she says. "He has amazing taste. But he wasn't like, 'Oh, it's my way or the highway, while we were redoing it. He's a professional, and he's done hundreds of homes. But he's also very collaborative."

Deschanel says they each picked up where the other left off. "He favors function—he wants everything to function well, flow well. He can look at a floor plan and know exactly how it's going to work practically, which is such an incredible skill. I like choosing decorfabrics, rugs, wallpapers, tiles, paint colors, all that stuff. That was my area."

What they created was a home where everyone in their lives is welcome. "We're very social. We love having people over," she says. "We love to have a party, sometimes casual, sometimes more formal."

Often they invite just their friends, and other times it's their friends plus their friends' kids. "Because, you know, then all the kids are happy."

The last sunset she saw was last night, she says, from her Los Angeles backyard. How does she describe it? "I felt like I was home," she says. And she's not leaving.

Cosplay Is **Our Culture**



The otherworldy beauty of 14,179-foot Mt. Shasta has inspired countless trips to Northern California and a fair share of legends too. Our favorite centers on the Lemurians, a tribe of advanced beings from a long-lost sunken continent who carved tunnels beneath the dormant volcano and occasionally appear on the slopes dressed in white robes. Andrew Oser, who leads spiritual tours of the mountain, was noncommittal about the Lemurians but did offer this: "My favorite way to describe Mt. Shasta is that it's a 14,000-foot mirror that reflects back the deepest truth in your heart."

We Think Our Burgers Belong in a Museum

The cheeseburger was invented in Pasadena in 1924 and arguably perfected two dozen years later when In-N-Out opened its first drive-thru in Baldwin Park, attracting legions of fans. Today you can visit a replica of the original In-N-Out-the photogenic mini-museum is just down the road from the original location and double-doubles as a souvenir stand.

Chalupas in Paradise We dare you to find a more alluring fast-food restaurant than the Taco Bell at 5200 Coast Highway in Pacifica. This prime real estate—right on Pacifica State Beach in San Mateo County—boasts a setting you might expect with a Michelin-starred meal, not a \$1 Cravings Menu. The ocean views are to die for, there's a parking lot for surfboards, and since this is a Taco Bell Cantina, you can also pair your Cheesy Gordita Crunch with a cocktail. The oceanfront eatery is so popular, it has hosted bachelor and bachelorette parties and even wedding receptions.

Disc Golf + Craft Beer = **Best Day Ever**

Boonville's Anderson Valley Brewing Company is the first—and perhaps only—brewery on the planet to offer an 18-hole disc-golf course onsite. Perfect your Tomahawk Shot or Jump Putt on this 26-acre facility while sipping some Boont Amber Ale or maybe a Briney Melon Gose.

Go Moke, **Get Stoked**

Touring the Golden State by moke, an allelectric, low-speed vehicle, is officially a thing. These adorably cute, street-legal rides have already made a big splash in Newport Beach, where you can channel your inner Barbie by renting a pink jeeplet and hitting the boutiques. (Your call on whether Ken and Allan get to come along for the ride.) You can also pair mokes with Merlot and Malbec on Temecula's Moke & Wine Tours. Half-day and full-day experiences come equipped with Moke Jockeys (aka designated drivers) who will drive you to Temecula Valley's top wineries.

LIFE IMITATES ART—LITERALLY When Leonardo da Vinci started working on The Last Supper, he probably didn't envision a collection of Orange County dentists, plumbers, and accountants reenacting his 15th-century masterpiece on an outdoor stage in Laguna Beach. But that's exactly the sort of thing you'll see at the coastal town's annual Pageant of the Masters. Volunteer actors recreate classical and contemporary works of art by dressing in costumes and posing against meticulously painted sets. It's an annual tradition that we freakin' love.



Mark Twain Respects Our Frog Game

Offbeat fun is nothing new to the Golden State. During the Gold Rush, entertainment-starved

miners were known to throw back a few drinks and bet on anything they could think of—a phenomenon captured in Mark Twain's 1865 short story, "The Celebrated Jumping Frog of Calaveras County." The tale became a worldwide hit, putting both Twain and tiny Angels Camp on the map. Today, you can relive all sorts of old-timey fun at the Calaveras County Fair and Jumping Frog Jubilee, held during the third week of May. The rest of the year, walk Main Street's sidewalk Hop of Fame. where winning frogs and their wranglers have been immortalized in brass since 1928

Our Faults Are Famous Shake things up the next time you're in Greater Palm Springs with Red Jeep Tours' three-hour journey through the San Andreas Fault, the source of much geologic movingand-shaking. Naturalist guides will lead you through narrow slot canyons and into a leafy native palm oasis.

You Can Earn an A+ in Mushroom School

Want to turn food acquisition into an adventure? Forage SF offers classes on foraging mushrooms, wild plants, and seaweed. The Bay Area company will teach you how to spot edible fungi like morels and porcinis on guided walks in Santa Cruz, Marin County, the Sonoma Coast, and the Sierra foothills. You can also learn how to forage for seaweed in Half Moon Bay or seek out wild edible plants in Oakland.



more than a half-dozen awards. We're also keen on 21st Amendment's Hell or High Watermelon; The Lost Abbey's Duck Duck Gooze; Bagby Beer's Gotta Pay the Pils; Stone Brewing's Arrogant Bastard Ale; and Fall River Brewing's Numb Numb Juice Hazy IPA.



32 Our Ghosts and Ghouls Will Entertain You

The Hotel del Coronado has a seriously spooky side: In 1892, 24-year-old Kate Morgan checked into this luxurious waterfront resort and then ended her life on the hotel's staircase. Since then, many guests have experienced strange breezes, flickering lights, and phantom footsteps believed to be evidence of the young woman's afterlife unrest.

The equally spooky Queen Mary is one of the "Top 10 Most Haunted Places in America," according to *Time* magazine. The after-hours Ship Walk Paranormal Tour is a perfect way to get your shiver on.

San Jose's Winchester Mystery House made the same prestigous list. Sara Winchester's macabre mansion features stairs that lead nowhere and doors that open to brick walls—presumably to disorient the departed.

San Francisco's Alcatraz Night Tour is another spine-chilling option, and not necessarily for the faint of heart. Paranormal expert Richard Senate once volunteered to be locked in a punishment cell in Alcatraz, an experience he calls "the most terrifying 15 minutes I ever spent."

We Have 3,600 Pickleball Courts... and Counting

Montecito resident Ellen DeGeneres is obsessed with the sport. Los Angeles Lakers forward LeBron James is also hooked—and has even invested in a professional pickleball league. Orange County native Will Ferrell is an avid "dinker," as are Billie Eilish, Leonardo DiCaprio, and the Kardashians.

You'll find pickleball courts pretty much everywhere, including many hotels and resorts. In San Diego County, Rancho Valencia Resort & Spa has four dedicated courts and free access for guests; Omni La Costa offers a weekly Pickleball 101 class; and the Fairmont Grand Del Mar offers weekend clinics. But we like West Hollywood's take best: The Kimpton La Peer Hotel has a rooftop pickleball setup that transforms into a "Disco Court" on weekends. You can practice your flapjacks and falafels while listening to a live DJ and sipping cocktails.

We Invented Tiki Bars World War I veteran Donn Beach fell in love with Polynesian culture and wanted to bring his passion for rum-fueled drinks to the states. He opened Don's Beachcomber (later renamed Don the Beachcomber) in Hollywood in 1933, sparking a trend that continues to this day. Tiki-Ti in Hollywood was founded in 1961 by a Don the Beachcomber bartender and serves 94 tropical cocktails. Bakersfield's Tiki-Ko is a classic of the genre, serving up concoctions like the Lady Monsoon and Tequila Guavolution, False Idol is a San Diego speakeasy that's hidden behind a stainless steel door inside Little Italy's Craft & Commerce. For the ultimate in mai tai mayhem, head to the Tonga Room & Hurricane Bar inside San Francisco's Fairmont Hotel. At this 1945 watering hole, the Island Groove Band plays from a thatched-roof barge on an aquamarine pool, and surprise thunder-andlightning storms steal the show.





Hang With Mickey Mouse on His Home Turf

Head to Mickey's Toontown at Disneyland Park to get better acquainted with the smiling mouse and his pals. Start by taking a spin on Mickey & Minnie's Runaway Railway, the first Disneyland Resort ride devoted to Walt Disney's original star. Let the kids burn some energy on the boat-shaped play structure in Donald's Duck Pond and the green spaces of CenTOONial Park. Then zip off to climb the dreaming tree or visit the candy factory in Goofy's How-To Play Yard. Lots of parentfriendly benches and a mellow, play-at-yourown-pace atmosphere combine to create an important element of any great theme park day: a little time to exhale.

Absolutely Everybody Can Take Part in the Fun

No matter the abilities or special needs of anyone in your crew, the Golden State's top attractions excel at accessibility. Sesame Place San Diego and The Living Desert Zoo and Gardens in Palm Desert, for instance, are both Certified Autism Centers where staffers are trained to support autistic guests. The parks offer amenities such as quiet rooms and sensory guides to help lower any stress and maximize fun. Other California theme parks, zoos, and aquariums—from SeaWorld San Diego to the Monterey Bay Aquarium to Six Flags Discovery Kingdom in Vallejo-offer skip-the-line ride passes, listening-assistance devices, noise-cancelling headphones, and dietary guides. Stop in at Guest Services to find out what's available.


Ride 20 Roller Coasters in One Afternoon

Santa Clarita's Six Flags Magic Mountain boasts 20 thrilling coasters, the most of any park on the planet. Love speed? Start at Superman: Escape from Krypton, the park's fastest ride, which zips around at up to 100 mph. Then head over to X2 for a spin on well-contained chaos: The ride features head-first drops and cars that rotate 360 degrees while moving at 76 mph. Test your nerve on Wonder Woman Flight of Courage. the world's longest and tallest single-rail coaster, or feel the g-force on Goliath, a "hypercoaster" that offers a 255-foot drop at 85 mph.

We Have Pirate Pride

The pirate ship Time Bandit sails Big Bear Lake's alpine waters, bringing a bounty of yo-ho-ho to those who remember the 1981 film (and their grandkids). Join the crew for 90 minutes of corny jokes and kidfriendly fun. Or head to Monterey's Cannery Row to experience Treasure Hunt: The Ride, an immersive adventure based on the legend of Monterey pirate Hippolyte Bouchard.





Join an Arctic **Rescue Mission**

Grab the handlebars of your snowmobileshaped roller coaster car on the Arctic Rescue ride at SeaWorld San Diego. A series of sudden, high-speed launches give you the feeling of zooming over rugged tundra at speeds as fast as 40 mph. When the thrills come to an end, get an up-close look at the Wild Arctic exhibit and learn about the park's real-life Rescue Squad, which has saved more than 40,000 animals. A short walk from the ride is the Rescue Jr. area, where kids can check out real Rescue Squad vehicles and climb around on ocean-themed play structures.

You Can Snooze With the Elephants

Don't just spend the day at a zoo, museum, or theme park. Spend the night, too, enjoying the scenery or wildlife like a true insider. At San Diego Zoo Safari Park, the overnight Roar & Snore Safaris include after-dark tours, breakfast, and glamping-style tents with sleeping pads, cots, or actual beds. Safari West in Sonoma County offers treehousestyle accommodations, while zoos such as the Sacramento Zoo, Fresno Chaffee Zoo, Oakland Zoo, and Santa Barbara Zoo host their own sleepover experiences. Bring your own camping gear, and they'll supply the s'mores fixings, camp activities, and breakfast.

Some museums do overnights, too, including the Fleet Science Center in San Diego, the Monterey Bay Aquarium, the Los Angeles Natural History Museum, and the California Academy of Sciences in San Francisco. You can also pack your sleeping bag and tent for special-event nights at Gilroy Gardens theme park or the Santa Cruz Beach Boardwalk. Kids will love staying up past bedtime to ride the rides after everyone else has gone home.

As soon as you walk through the rainbowcolored "warp pipe" into SUPER NINTENDO WORLD, you know you've entered a new themepark dimension at Universal Studios Hollywood. Red-and-white mushrooms and piranhas dot this video-game kingdom. The castles of Princess Peach and Bowser, backed by Mount Beanpole, frame the sky.

Start racking up points in a real-life version of the classic games. Push buttons to "throw" shells on the indoor ride Mario Kart: Bowser's Challenge, then make the most of the interactive stations-smacking giant alarm clocks, punching POW buttons, and using your own shadow to jump at fireballs.

Competitive types can track their scores by purchasing a Power-Up Band; the rest of us can just celebrate afterward with a Luigi Burger at Toadstool Café.

49 The Danish Capital of America Is Here

In 1911, a group of Danish Americans purchased 9,000 acres in the Santa Ynez Valley, an area that turned out to be prime wine country. The founders brought Danish cuisine and architecture with them, and now millions of visitors flock to Solvang to see its windmills, thatched roofs, and rooftop storks—and snack on aebleskivers between Pinot Noir tastings.

50 Full-Throttle Fun Abounds

Ditch the furiousness and just go fast at one of the closed-track driving facilities in the Golden State. The BMW Performance Driving School south of Palm Springs will put you behind the wheel of an ultra-speedy M Series BMW, and you can let loose and see what it can do. Skip Barber Racing School operates out of Sonoma Raceway, offering a wide variety of racing and driving experiences on a 12-turn track. And at WeatherTech Raceway Laguna Seca near Salinas, you can watch top IndyCar pros rule the asphalt.

51 Sand Castles Are Serious Business

In Carmel, autumn's biggest event is the annual Great Sandcastle Contest sponsored by the Monterey Bay chapter of the American Institute of Architects. Sand-construction teams build shapely mermaids, fanciful sea creatures, and tower-topped castles one bucket at a time. The judges happily accept non-monetary bribes, and the best architecture wins the coveted Golden Shovel Award. At day's end, the surging tide returns all contest entries to the sea.

52 You Can Thank The Academy

With a trip to The Academy Museum of Motion Pictures, you can let the magic of special effects transport you to Hollywood's night of nights. The Oscars Experience lets you hold a coveted eight-and-a-half-pound statuette and deliver an acceptance speech in front of a virtual audience of industry bigwigs. (Video evidence of your achievement is emailed afterward.) You might be tempted to prattle on about all of the little people who helped you on your journey, but don't blab too much—the music will swell and you will get played off the stage.

53 Our Whales Are Show-Offs

Gray whales, humpbacks, and even massive blue whales are common sightings year-round along California's coast. On a half-day whale-watching cruise out of Newport Beach, Dana Point, or Monterey, you'll see the massive cetaceans perform tail flukes, spy-hops, or even full leaps out of the water (breaches). Whether it's your first whale sighting or your 100th, the thrill never wears off.

54 We Host the World's Wackiest Race

What began as a two-block jaunt down Main Street in Ferndale in 1969 has since morphed into a 40-mile odyssey across Humboldt County. Arcata's annual Kinetic Grand Championship simultaneously begs for and defies description. Entrants must build their own kinetic sculptures, defined as "all-terrain, human-powered art vehicles, engineered to race over road, water, mud, and sand." Design flourishes like animated faces and fire cannons are practically mandatory, and costumes are strongly encouraged. A winner is crowned every year, but that seems beside the point.

55 Dogs and Santa Surf, and So Can You

People go a bit crazy for surfing here, and so do their dogs. Faith, a goggles-clad American pit bull terrier, took home the top prize in the large dog division at last year's World Dog Surfing Championships in Pacifica. It's an August tradition that needs to be on every canine lover's to-do list. Later in the year, Kris Kringle hits the waves at The Ritz-Carlton, Laguna Niguel. The resort hosts an annual Surfing Santa & Stand-Up Paddleboard Contest that benefits Surfers Healing, a surf camp for children with autism.

You, too, can rule the waves. Surf classes are offered up and down the coast, including

Santa Barbara Surf School, Surf Diva in La Jolla, Banzai Surf in Huntington Beach, Adventure Out in Santa Cruz, and Tommy Tsunami Surf School in Half Moon Bay.

56 This Is Where Comedy Legends Get Their Start

For more than 45 years, the Groundlings Theatre & School has been a Los Angeles improv institution and the training ground for many big names in comedy, including Will Ferrell, Phil Hartman, Lisa Kudrow, Jon Lovitz, Melissa McCarthy, Laraine Newman, Paul Reubens, Maya Rudolph, and Kristen Wiig. The 30-member company still entertains audiences nightly, and although Ferrell and others have moved on, you can still see Stephanie Courtney, better known as "Flo" from Progressive Insurance ads, and Patty Guggenheim, who yukked it up as Madisynn on the Disney+ series She-Hulk.


Ski or Ride on July 4


SUPERBLOOMS ARE THE BEST BLOOMS

beautiful, but the term "superbloom" refers to a high-octane version of the annual display. What makes the magic happen? Superblooms occur when rain falls in frequent intervals between October and February—especially when that rain follows a long period of drought. This leads to widespread germination of wildflower seeds that may have lain dormant for years. Your best bet for witnessing something spectacular? Watch the weather, keep a bag packed, and embrace the spontaneity.

The Golden State's spring flower show is always









changed in 2020, we suddenly found ourselves unable to leave Australia. As an American, the pandemic led to years without seeing family. During this time, my partner (co-author Caroline Clements) and I had a baby. We had a lot to share with our loved ones back in the U.S.

As the restrictions began to loosen, we started to do what we've always done together: plan an adventure. We decided to write our next book about California. Just the idea filled us with hope. In a short period of time, travel had become so fraught with danger and fear that we wanted to reclaim it—the joy of it—for ourselves.

We bought an old 24-foot motor home sight unseen on Craigslist and moved in for six months with our two-year-old son Leo, wondering what the hell we'd gotten ourselves into.

Water, the most precious and endangered resource on the planet, was our focus. And it became the key to our understanding of California. Where water goes, after all, life follows.

We treat swimming as an access point to exploring the many wild and diverse identities of the state. The variety of environments in California continues to amaze us. Each one of the landscapes is an icon in its own right—the dusty chaparral and endless sun-drenched beaches; towering canyons and emerald pools; volcanic peaks and glacial lakes. The many long, slow river miles that wind through oak forests and vineyards.

The more I thought about it, the more I realized that this trip would not just be a snapshot from this period of our lives, but also the culmination of decades of informal research. When I was 18, I moved from New Mexico into a 12-by-10-foot tent cabin in Yosemite Valley. My roommate slept two feet away from me and snored so loud that I would often jolt awake in the night thinking there was a rockslide. It was the best summer of my life.

Like so many people before and after me, the Sierra forever altered my trajectory. I returned year after year. I met brilliant, hilarious, optimistic people living nomadic lifestyles. These men and women had proudly pulled out of a traditional career path to live in the wilderness—to climb, to hike, to swim, and to surf. They followed the seasons across California and around the world. It rewired my young brain. I didn't know you were allowed to live that wav.

It set me off on a path of exploration that led to Australia, where Caroline and I met. We found a connection in our love of travel and were soon planning trips. Surf trips. Road trips. Backpacking trips. We began writing books. We've been lucky to have spent much of our time together exploring new places and writing travel guides. Yet California is the place that always draws us back.

What is it about this state that changes generation after generation of visitors? What is so special about California? In many ways, that is the question we set out to answer in our book. There is something so profoundly addictive and awe-inspiring about the California wilderness that it changes your life. It demands that you savor every moment.

At first, we couldn't resist the pull of the Sierra. I dragged Caroline (and Leo) up mountains and into freezing lakes (mostly just Caroline)—often joined by our family and friends. We soaked in hot springs and slept under the stars. Our exploration expanded in concentric circles. Driving up and down the coast, camping among peaceful redwoods, sipping beers on lazy river floats. Gradually, it shifted from my place to our place.

To say California is diverse is like calling Miles Davis a trumpet player. Factually correct, but woefully inadequate. Each region has a distinctive character that makes it feel like a new country. Northern California is a vast and wild part of the state that includes some of the most varied wilderness areas in America, spanning sleepy redwoods to

volcanic mountain ranges. The Sierra, a masterpiece of gravity, water, and stone. The Bay Area, a dense cultural and culinary epicenter. Gold Country, an interwoven series of pristine rivers and charming former boomtowns. Central California, the perfect cross-section encompassing the dramatic Big Sur coastline, but also giant sequoia groves and crystalline rivers. Finally, Southern California, the golden child and home to possibly the most photographed, filmed, and crooned about places in the world. Yet it still finds ways to surprise you.

California has some of the most diverse landscapes, and hence some of the most diverse swims. The best beaches range from sunny coves to bays with sandstone bluffs, to inland river beaches with impossibly clear water. Some are sandy, some are rocky, and all are truly world-class





And though it's a near-impossible choice, we do have some favorites. We could write a whole book on the Yuba River and its various forks. From Emerald Pools, near the Sierra crest, down to Buttermilk Bend at the edge of the Sacramento Valley, the shimmering South Fork contains some of California's most stunning swimming holes, with miles of smooth granite boulders and intensely green water.

Just outside of Nevada City, one place stands apart. Highway 49 Crossing is a popular locals' spot and the de-facto public square. The historic arched bridge perfectly frames a sprawling pool of deep, clear water. There's plenty of space here, and seen from above, the colorful towels, umbrellas, and inflatable rings create a sumptuous summer scene. About a mile upstream is Hoyt's Crossing, a broad pebble beach set in a half-pipe of polished granite walls. Butterflies dance around the water, willow trees shade sandy beaches, and unclad sunbakers lie on smooth boulders (it's Nevada City's unofficial nudist beach). There is something here for everyone.

In stark contrast, another one of our favorite places was the town of Tecopa, a bizarre desert outpost sitting virtually alone in the southeast corner of the state, iust outside of Death Valley National Park. Here, the sublime, otherworldly beauty of the Mojave Desert is a mineral palette saturated by the winter sun. Chloride green rocks, yellow sulfur hills, and black mountains with white borax scars serve as the backdrop to abundant hot springs.

Clusters of tall palms are scattered among natural thermal pools, a Japanese sento-style bathhouse, and a simple resort where kitschy classical busts, friezes, and fountains adorn the common areas like a post-apocalyptic Caesars Palace. Artists, brewers, and chefs have found their way to this frontier community of eccentrics and nonconformists. There are a couple of breweries, a barbecue joint, a five-table steakhouse, and a café. The best part: no cell phone service.

California is dense, and six months of travel flew by. Our trip didn't always go as planned, but we woke up each morning with a sense of wonder and curiosity for

the next adventure around the corner. We were buoyed by the many people who helped guide our adventures, by sharing their own experiences and advice. The kind strangers who fed us and gave us a place to park. Mechanics who got us back on the road as quickly as possible. Our friends and family who joined us throughout the journey. All of them helped us to capture the California that we know and love.

Most importantly, we found the answer to our question: What makes California so special? It gives us permission to be small. To be dwarfed by places that are so much greater than us and feel awe at being part of it all. Being in nature, and better yet being alone in nature, allows us to unburden our cluttered minds and become totally engrossed in the present. It's an increasingly rare gift to be able to focus our senses, whether in the concentrated effort of hiking up a steep hill or in the crushing exhilaration of cold water squeezing the air from your lungs. These moments make us feel truly alive.

Our book is a reminder that the best of what our world has to offer lies in the things we cannot make. Enjoy these precious, beautiful places. Take care of them and protect them. Drink them in with joy and share them with the people





BADGER PASS YOSEMITE NORDIC

Helling guides backcountry skiing tours and sets up crosscountry skiers and snowshoers with rental equipment, then points them toward snowblanketed meadows and mountain vistas.

VISITOR TIPS: "Beginners can ski or snowshoe along Glacier Point Road to Summit Meadow, about two miles round-trip. It's groomed almost every night. More experienced skiers can continue to Clark Range Vista for a view of the eastern peaks, or go to Dewey Point, which is a trek to an iconic vista."

APRÈS-SKI: "I like to bring my kids to the ice rink at Curry Village. You can skate, or you can just sip hot chocolate with a great view of Half Dome."

BEN MOGREN

PALISADES TAHOE EXECUTIVE CHEF

Mogren heads up nine slope-side eateries, overseeing a team of 250 spread across four mountains. He started working in restaurants during his years as a ski racer, then decided to attend the Culinary Institute of America. **CHALLENGES:** "Getting the food to our on-mountain locations requires a ton of logistics. Most of it goes up the chairlifts, the Funitel, and the aerial tram. We also have a World War II-era snowcat that carries food and supplies. Our team doesn't just cook; they also shovel snow." **MOUNTAIN FOOD:** "Each restaurant is different. We serve everything from chorizo-crusted halibut at Granite Bistro to spicy Nashville chicken sandwiches in Olympic House and Californiastyle burritos at Funi's."

NORTHSTAR CALIFORNIA SNOWMAKING MANAGER

Hutchison and his team combine air and water to make snow using large underground pipes and hydrants all over the mountain. "We make snow every year regardless of how much falls from the sky. We start in the fall long before the resort opens. Ideally, we make a good base, then Mother Nature delivers the rest."

PERKS: "Snowmakers care about their jobs to an absurd degree. It's hard work, but we get to see the results. And we get to watch the sunrise and the sunset from the top of the mountain. When you see the

MANAGER OF TERRAIN PARKS

Dotto and a crew of welders, carpenters, and painters design and build terrain parks. "We're building jumps and rails to suit the 'rad dad' and his kids, and we're also building for extremely advanced riders."

HOW THEY DO IT: "We have a night crew that installs features and resurfaces the park while everyone is sleeping. During the day, a crew of riders tests each feature to make sure it's safe." PERKS: "I love getting to enjoy the features we've built. Going off jumps gives me that surge of adrenaline that I love so much."

AMY ARMSTRONG **≫**

KIRKWOOD SKI PATROL ARTILLERY MANAGER

Armstrong and her team use hand-thrown explosives and military artillery to protect skiers from destructive avalanches. "The mountain has so many avalanche paths that we need all hands on deck to get the resort open. The goal is to trigger small avalanches so that larger ones don't happen." **CHALLENGES:** "Snow is always changing, and we're trying to predict and manage it. But you can never fully control the mountain. We're aware of the dangers, and that makes our patrollers a really tight family. We look out for each other."





MIRANDA

SUGAR BOWL GONDOLA OPERATOR

Edwards operates the Village Gondola, which takes guests from the parking lot to Sugar Bowl Village.

HOW THEY DO IT: "At 7 a.m., we start loading people into the gondola cabinsemployees, hotel guests, skiers, and riders. People have equipment, groceries, dogs, babies. It's fast-paced, but I like the hustle. I try to keep a calm, friendly face even if there's chaos."

VISITOR TIP: "The top of Lincoln chair has the best view of Donner Lake and the wilderness on Sugar Bowl's back side."

KRYAN

HEAVENLY MOUNTAIN SKI RESORT ASSISTANT SKI PATROL DIRECTOR

Ski patrollers are problem solvers, McPartland says. "We move around the ski area looking for hazards, grooming issues, changing snow conditions. A big part of our job is identifying hazards and coming up with the safest way to mitigate them. If a skier gets injured, we're here to help."

THE TEAM: "We have about 70 full-time patrollers who are certified EMTs. We also have six avalanche rescue dogs, including my golden retriever Yuba. The dogs' primary function is for avalanche rescues, but they do their share of guest relations, too. They make people smile."



Golden State Cider's taproom is the perfect place to enjoy a pint; it's also a retail outlet selling the popular Mighty Dry blend, specialty ciders, and merch featuring the oh-so-cute otter mascot.

Known as the Rodeo Drive of the Desert, this mile-long stretch in Greater Palm Springs is known for luxe brands like Gucci and Ralph Lauren, which you'll find at The Shops on El Paseo, along with independent high-end clothing boutiques. The Gardens on El Paseo, an open-air mall on the strip, hosts the West Coast's largest consumer fashion show every spring.

IS FOR FLEA MARKETS

Want to capture California's effortlessly cool style? Shop for vintage clothing and one-of-a-kind treasures. Pasadena's monthly Rose Bowl Flea Market is the biggest on the West Coast; add other L.A.-area stops like Melrose Trading Post and

Los Feliz Flea Market to your browse list as well. Farther north, TreasureFest offers views of the San Francisco Bay while Berkeley Flea is known for its art and accessories from international yendors.

IS FOR GOLDEN GATE MERCANTILE

General stores showcase California's small-town charm with trinkets and local delicacies that make for the perfect souvenirs. Nestled on an idyllic street between Victorian buildings in Ferndale, Golden Gate Mercantile has it all: an old-fashioned candy counter, heirloom jewelry, handmade

lotions and soaps, and period headwear. The two-story shop also features a small museum with displays of artifacts from the 1800s and a millinery showing how hats were once made. You'll find more homegrown shops up and down the state, from McCloud Mercantile Co. in Shasta Cascade to San Diego's Rust General Store.

IS FOR HOTEL POP-UP SHOPS

We're not talking lobby gift shops—picture ultra-luxury boutique experiences like Dioriviera, a summer pop-up previously based at Rosewood Miramar Beach and Beverly Hills Hotel. At Stanly Ranch in Napa and The Ritz-Carlton, Laguna Niguel, you can browse like a VIP year-round at the Fifth Avenue Club pop-up. Personal stylists from Saks Fifth

Avenue will bring a selection of designer clothing and accessories to the hotel and create a curated shopping display just for you.

IS FOR INDEPENDENT BOOKSTORES



IS FOR JUST ONE EYE ▼

Explore this L.A. emporium where the art world meets fashion (and a little bit of history). Works by Murakami hang on the walls, while rare designer pieces—like a \$55,000 backpack collab created by artist Damien Hirst and The Row—line the shelves. The central L.A. boutique offers its uber-luxe, elite shopping experience inside an art deco building that formerly housed Howard Hughes' business operations.



IS FOR KJ MURPHY'S ▶

Calling all cowboys: This hat maker in the Santa Ynez Valley takes his measurements for bespoke headwear in a swanky Western-style atelier. You can customize every detail, down to the trimmings on the brim.

IS FOR LUXURY

The directory at South Coast Plaza in Costa Mesa reads like a who's who of high fashion. There's Hermès, Dior, Burberry, and dozens more alongside affordable luxury including Coach and Michael Kors. It's one of the most expansive (and expensive!) malls in the country. The red carpet is rolled out for VIPs at the exclusive Access Lounge, where big spenders can sip complimentary Champagne and savor small snacks. To see the biggest Chanel boutique in the U.S., visit Rodeo Drive, where the fashion house recently joined other standouts on the Beverly Hills street, such as a three-story Gucci flagship and the largest Harry Winston salon in the world. If you love a good deal, find the largest concentration of luxury outlets in California—around 180 stores, including Armani, Celine, Prada, and Saint Laurent—at Desert Hills Premium Outlets near Palm Springs.



IS FOR MUSEUM GIFT SHOPS V

As beautifully curated as the exhibits they help support, these onsite stores are packed with take-home treasures. Reprints of masterpieces can be found at the SFMOMA Museum

Store, along with jewelry, lamps, clocks, and other

housewares. Let kids wander the gift shops at California Academy of Sciences and Exploratorium in San Francisco and MOXI in Santa Barbara—all three offer STEM toys inspired by popular exhibits. In L.A., pick up cinematic memorabilia at the Academy Museum Store, signed collectible vinyl at the Grammy Museum, or Van Gogh-inspired glass earrings at The Getty. Check out the diverse collection of museums in San Diego's Balboa Park, where shop souvenirs range from lucky cats at the Japanese Friendship Garden to graphic novels at the Comic-Con Museum.



IS FOR NIK KACY

The founder of Equality Fashion Week, NiK Kacy is also the pioneering creative behind the first gender-equal luxury footwear line. An Asian immigrant and former Google project manager turned designer, they run their eponymous brand out of a downtown L.A. HQ, creating high-top sneakers, combat boots, and other styles for genders and identities on all spectrums.



To save big, you need to think big. How big? 1,422,000 square feet, to be exact. The Inland



Empire is home to this sprawling complex of around 200 stores—which makes it not only California's largest outlet, but also the biggest single-level mall on the West Coast. You can score deals at Nordstrom Rack, Saks Off Fifth, and Nike Factory Store, and browse outlet outposts for all budgets-from Kate Spade and Coach to Forever 21 and H&M.

IS FOR PROMENADES

Pack your walking shoes—California's downtown stretches are packed with local shops and designer boutiques. Spots like Santa Monica's Third Street Promenade are car-free, making it easy to stroll at your

leisure. In Santa Barbara, the 10-block State Street Promenade is filled with galleries and clothing stores like Brandy Melville, Vuori, and Lululemon. And in downtown San Diego, the Gaslamp Promenade features plazas lined with shops selling candy, shoes, and custom jewelry.



IS FOR QUEEN BEE MARKET

Twice a year in San Diego County, SoCal's longest-running makers' market offers a chance to browse jewelry, pottery, accessories, clothing, and vintage wares from more than 100 artisans. You can meet the makers in person or take a pop-up workshop to learn skills like leatherworking and wreath-making.

IS FOR ROADSIDE STANDS

Pull over for the perfect pit stop. A California road trip can showcase the state's vast agricultural bounty. Dig into sweet, salty, and savory specialty snacks, including oils and vinegars at the Olive Pit in Corning, fresh and pickled products at Garlic World in Gilroy, and dried apricots at Casa de Fruta in Hollister. Or stretch your legs at Bravo Farms, a Kettleman City stopover that features a play area for kids, old-fashioned ice cream and date shakes, and a winetasting counter.



Gear up for the official state sport at dozens of stores lining the coast, from Mollusk Surf Shop in San Francisco to Jack's Surfboards in Huntington Beach (where the Surfing Walk of Fame

is etched into the sidewalk) to Hansen Surfboards, San Diego County's largest surf store founded by pro shaper Don Hansen. At O'Neill's Capitola corporate office—founded by the man who trademarked the phrase "surf shop"—you can not only purchase a wetsuit, but also see one of the brand's first designs.

IS FOR THICK AS THIEVES

A husband-and-wife team in Palm Springs runs a downtown boutique filled with odds and ends created by local makers, including apparel like Palm Springs t-shirts, handmade jewelry, and apothecary goods. A soy wax blend candle, hand-

poured by Joshua Tree Candle Co., is a great way to revisit your desert getaway after you return home.





IS FOR YASUKO

IS FOR UNION SQUARE

Heralded as the heart of San Francisco-and fittingly marked by heart-shaped sculptures at each corner—this shopping district is where you can find everything from luxury jewelry and handbags at Louis Vuitton and Dior to athletic wear at Nike. It's surrounded by shopping streets like Maiden Lane, a pedestrian-friendly stretch with shops including Chanel, Van Cleef & Arpels, and Bottega Veneta. Stop by Neiman Marcus to

get a view of the square from the four-story rotunda, enclosed by an opulent stained-glass dome that's part of the original 1800s-era department store.

reimagines vintage Japanese textiles into one-of-a-kind fashions on display in her downtown boutique. Drawing inspiration from her upbringing as the daughter of a kimono dealer, she infuses artistry and culture into pieces like sashiko-stitched vests, handmade jewelry, and home goods.

IS FOR VANS This homegrown O.C. skate brand, born in Anaheim in 1966, has a Huntington Beach

boutique attached to the official Vans Off the Wall Skatepark. Shop for your shoes and a new board-and maybe a pair of cool checkerboard slip-ons for back home-and hit the free 35,000-square-foot action sports playground.



WILKES BASHFORD

The legacy of San Francisco's legendary menswear clothier lives on in his eponymous department store. A curator of luxury styles, Bashford brought designers like Brunello Cucinelli to the city at a time where long hair and hippie tie-dye were de rigueur. Today, a high-end shopping experience awaits with made-to-measure style advisers, a custom jewelry studio, and a fully stocked bar with Scotch, coffee, and snacks.






IS FOR **ZERO-WASTE SHOPS**

When in the Golden State, think green. You can embrace an eco-friendly ethos at sustainable shops known for zero-waste packaging such as Fill Good Co. in Berkeley, which is stocked with self-care goodies like eucalyptus muscle rubs, clay masks, and lip balms. If you're headed to SoCal, the certified woman-owned small business Sustain LA has more giftables, from salves and scrubs to essential oils and exfoliants. And Eco Now is bringing a new wave of sustainability to O.C. as the first green-certified business in Costa Mesa, with additional locations in Anaheim, Laguna Beach, and Riverside. The boutiques have treasures like smallbatch perfumes and locally sourced, handmade body care products.







et a flash tattoo. Dance across a light floor. Step into a thunderstorm. Museums in San Diego dispel the long-held notion that you should look but not touch. The first West Coast location of the high-tech WNDR Museum opened last year with immersive exhibits like Quantum Mirror, which pairs reflective surfaces with digital visuals, and Masterpiece, where you can render famous artworks unrecognizable with the shake of your arm. With kids in tow, visit the Museum of Illusions, a new

Gaslamp Quarter experience with mindbending interactive exhibits.

There's plenty happening at San Diego's mainstays, too. Popnology at the Comic-Con Museum features futuristic technology such as driverless cars, robots, and 3D printers the latter of which was used to create a life-sized Back to the Future DeLorean car. The Nature Garden at the San Diego Natural History Museum also debuts this spring, letting visitors wander along interpretive trails surrounded by native plants.

EDITOR'S PICKS

The Beach Bug is all the buzz in Pacific Beach. The new electric shuttle service lets beachgoers hitch a ride to top neighborhood destinations and the Balboa Transit Station.

For the first time, a U.S. city has been selected as the new World Design Capital. The San Diego-Tijuana region will host a year-long program of lectures, exhibits, and performances that celebrate the power of design across the binational communities.

Petco Park, home of the San Diego Padres, was named the best MLB ballpark by USA Today in 2023, and a \$20 million renovation of Gallagher Square makes it even better. Expect a brandnew baseball-themed playground, an off-leash dog park, and a viewing deck that houses a bronze statue of Mr. Padre himself, Hall of Fame right fielder Tony Gwynn.

Part tour and part tasting, the Carlsbad Aquafarm excursion includes a guided walk with touch tanks, a shucking class, and a seat on a patio where you can savor the views and the bivalves at SoCal's only oyster farm.

NORTH PARK

Lafayette Hotel

If walls could talk, North Park's decades-old Lafayette Hotel would have some colorful stories to tell. Its very first guest-who visited back in 1946—was entertainer Bob Hope. Hollywood stars like Lana Turner, Katharine Hepburn, and Bing Crosby once retreated here from Tinseltown. But over the years, the Colonial-style property had lost a bit of its luster.

With a \$31 million makeover completed in 2023, what was old is shiny, colorful, and new again. An ornate European-style lobby with richly patterned banquettes leads to the pool, an atrium-style bar, and the Beginner's Diner, a 24/7 eatery inspired by a 1940s Worcester lunch car. Off the lobby are the romantic Oaxacan restaurant Quixote and The Gutter, a cocktail bar that invites all players with a two-lane bowling alley plus skeeball and pop-a-shot.

The 131 rooms showcase whimsical art deco details: canopied beds, chairs festooned with animal prints and tassels, and throwback wallpaper that depicts giant lizards and hunting parties. Most of the rooms have city views, but a few open up onto the pool, with a movie starworthy chaise waiting outside your door.





VENTURE OFF THE BEATEN PATH TO EXPLORE SAN DIEGO'S VIBRANT CHICANO MURALS AND NEIGHBORING BUSINESSES

AN ARTISTIC AWAKENING

More than 100 outdoor paintings at Chicano Park tell an important story. In the 1970s, shortly after hundreds of locals formed a human chain to save the land from development, colorful artworks began to appear on the concrete pylons beneath Coronado Bay Bridge. Today, it's the world's largest collection of Chicano murals.

Opened in late 2022, the Chicano Park Museum and Cultural Center provides an in-depth look at the public art and historical narrative of the Chicano movement. Also check out Bread & Salt, a cutting-edge gallery in Logan Heights showing original works from local and international artists.

AUTHENTIC EATS

You'll find one of San Diego's oldest Mexican restaurants along Logan Avenue. Las Cuatro Milpas has been refining its homemade tortillas since 1933. Crowds wrap around the block to order no-frills taco plates. Don't miss the rolled tacos—and don't forget to bring cash (they don't accept plastic).

BOTTOMS UP

Por Vida brews up horchata cold brews and Mexican mochas in a cafe where eye-catching murals bring a bit of the neighborhood flavor indoors. For the harder stuff, Border X Brewing is a local favorite with a horchata golden stout and a hibiscus saison inspired by the Mexican drink agua de jamaica.

SHOP SMALL

Surrounding Chicano Park is an equally colorful shopping scene centered around Logan Avenue. Palm Springs

Brandini Toffee is famous for its buttery, crunchy confections, but on the hottest days, order the toffee ice cream bar-vanilla ice cream dipped in milk chocolate and covered in almond toffee crumbles. Pair it with a toffee milkshake for an off-the-charts sugar high.

Cathedral City

Cool off with Azucena's raspados, or Mexican shaved ice. A machine scrapes fine crystals from large blocks of ice, and the powdery snow is topped with pineapple, mango, pistachio, or tamarind syrup-plus chunks of fruit and a dash of chili lime salt.

Palm Desert

Tucked into The Gardens on El Paseo. Perfect Pint churns out frozen custard. an old-school blend of egg yolks, milk, cream, and sugar. The shop's small-batch lineup includes banana pudding, Black Forest cake, peanut butter and jelly, and Nutella s'mores.

La Quinta

Right before your eyes at Nitroinfusions your dessert is flash-frozen in liquid nitrogen, which eliminates ice crystals and air to produce a super-smooth frozen concoction. Flavors include bananalavender, strawberry cheesecake, and salted caramel.





ld Town Temecula has an undeniable Western flair, but Two Travelers Wine Bar + Merchant is anything but old-fashioned. Leave the Wild West behind when you step over the threshold of this new wine bar from the ownership team behind Temecula's toprated eatery, Goat & Vine.

While food is the main event at the restaurant, the upscale bar goes all-in on grapes with hand-selected wines on its curated wine list. Sink into a plush couch to sip pours produced in the Temecula Valley and around the world. On-staff certified

sommeliers can lend their expert palates to help you choose a vintage to enjoy by the glass or bottle.

Complement your wine with shareable plates like garlic-butter prawns, chicken pâté with berry compote, and focaccia bruschetta made with bread baked in-house. Unwind and enjoy the chic-yet-relaxed vibe with moody lighting, floor-to-ceiling wine shelves, and rustic wood tables that offer a subtle nod to Temecula's cowboy heritage.

EDITOR'S PICKS

Possibly the longestrunning pop-up restaurant in Riverside, Cenaduría Oaxaqueña Donaji is also one of the hottest parties in town. Taste authentic Oaxacan cuisine—tlayuda platters and molotes, among other dishes-served in a local family's backyard.

Once a general store circa 1947, the renovated Creekstone Inn now pairs the rustic vibes of Idyllwild's mountains with modern design flourishes. While the lobby has all the coziness of a woodpaneled ski chalet, guest rooms are appointed with upscale finishes like in-room fireplaces and a clawfoot bathtub in the 1,200-square-foot private cottage.

Gather round the wood stove in your private chalet at Noble+Proper, Big Bear's newest mountain lodge. It's just one of many little luxuries—guests also enjoy complimentary French press coffee, sparkling water, and loaner bikes.

This Corona crystal shop has a speakeasy spirit. Shop for gems, jewelry, and chakra-balancing bowls at Manifested Lab, then pop into the hidden café for coffee, tea, and live music.



72 Hours in the Inland **Empire**

The Inland Empire is a hub for America's pastime, hosting minor league franchises for SoCal's three Major League Baseball teams: the Padres, Angels, and Dodgers. For a family-friendly way to explore, pick a three-day weekend and see a game at each team's ballpark.

LAKE ELSINORE STORM

The San Diego Padres' Single-A affiliate is turning up the heat in this I.E. town bordering Southern California's largest natural freshwater lake. Before hitting the ballpark, enjoy a slice at Stadium Pizza, a sports-themed joint with a microbrewery on site. Fill your downtime with a picnic at Elm Grove Beach or hiking through wildflower fields at Walker Canyon. Grab your gear at Storm Stadium or stop by the nearby Lake Elsinore Outlets to purchase ball caps or other collectible sports memorabilia. For night games, book an affordable room at nearby hotels including Best Western Plus Lake Elsinore Inn & Suites.

INLAND EMPIRE 66ERS, SAN BERNARDINO

Get the inside scoop on the Los Angeles Angels of Anaheim's future talent at San Manuel Stadium, which is also a stone's throw from one of the city's most popular attractions—the Original McDonald's Site and Museum.



Opened in 1940, the colorful building houses 80 years of history with memorabilia like news clippings, Happy Meal toys, and retro machinery. Fast food's not all there is to eat here, though there is another local connection: Mitla Cafe along Route 66 often has a line out the door thanks to a family recipe that was the inspiration behind Taco Bell's creation.

Get some fresh air at Glen Helen Regional Park, where kids can enjoy the splash pad and water slides in the summer. You'll have your pick of budget hotels along I-10 or you can drive south to Riverside for a luxury getaway at the historic Mission Inn Hotel & Spa.

RANCHO CUCAMONGA QUAKES

Catch back-to-back games at LoanMart Field, home to the Dodgers' Single-A team. Plan a stay at the Four Points by Sheraton, which puts you within walking distance of the Victoria Gardens mall. 

neak behind a sliding bookcase in San Clemente to find a sleek tiki bar serving up temaki sushi and cocktails mixed with housemade bitters and tinctures. Momoku No Usagi lets spirits shine with cocktails like the rye-based Pumpernickel and a series of old-fashioned cocktails crafted with Japanese whisky. Opened in late 2022, Momoku No Usagi means "the blind rabbit" in Japanese, the name of the owner's other secret spot that draws crowds in the Anaheim Packing District. It's one of the newest additions to O.C.'s speakeasy scene, along with Kai Lounge's whiskey room in Huntington Beach. Walk through the Pacific City restaurant to access this coastal cocktail den hidden beyond a set of shelves. With just 10 seats, it's an exclusive way to sip whiskeys and Tokyo-inspired cocktails or enjoy an 18-course omakase dinner.

The vibe runs more Western in Costa Mesa, where **Cowboys & Poodles** puts a casual spin on the speakeasy experience. Cowboy hats dangling from the ceiling welcome visitors into a space where a disco ball spinning below a wagon wheel doesn't seem out of place. If you can't snag prime seating inside the stagecoach carriage, sidle up to the bar and grab a stool shaped like a horse's hindquarters. Come for the cocktails—A Whole Mood with pineapple rum and sage bitters is a winner—but stay for a raucous good time that includes burlesque dancers and flaming drinks.

EDITOR'S PICKS

Check out the Pridethemed rainbow tower at West Street Beach-the first in O.C.-installed in summer 2023 to celebrate the LGBTO+ community's history in Laguna Beach.

Step into the world of Big Hero 6 at Disney California Adventure Park, where the new San Fransokyo Square houses a food court of East-meets-West flavors. Give Baymax a fistbump before grabbing a cold one from the new Port of San Fransokyo Cervecería.


It's free to wander the 25,000 square feet of exhibit space at Orange County Museum of Art, Costa Mesa's newest cultural hot spot housing modern and contemporary works. The all-day cafe, Verdant, is a museum highlight on the third floor with a mostly vegetarian menu created by award-winning local chefs

Look up at the Santa Ana Zoo, where a treetop trail system in the Amazon's Edge exhibit has created an irresistible aerial play space for monkeys. There's also an underwater viewing area for giant river otters, an endangered species rarely seen in zoos.









Garden Grove

STEP BACK IN TIME

Asphalt gives way to brick-like pavement in Garden Grove's historic district, which packs a nostalgic punch in a walkable one-block stretch. Main Street mainstays like the 1950s-inspired diner Kaye's Kitchen and Azteca Mexican Restaurant—where Elvis memorabilia lines the walls—evoke a cozy, mid-20th-century nostalgia.

The arcade bar Barcode pays homage to the more recent past with 1990s pop-culture decor and retro video games like "Street Fighter" and "Sega Blast City." There's more history up the street at the Stanley Ranch Museum, a two-acre complex of historic buildings, including the garage Walt Disney used as an animation studio in 1923.

GRAB A BITE

Find Vietnamese flavors at Pho 79, a Michelin Bib Gourmand eatery where visitors line up to slurp oxtail noodle soup. Two miles away, Brodard Chateau is an upscale spot beloved for nem nuong cuon (pork spring rolls wrapped in rice paper).

Nosh your way through Steelcraft, an open-air food hall packed with shipping-container eateries serving casual fare. Sample Korean-Filipino barbecue from Barrio or burgers and dogs from The Penalty Box, a concept by National Hockey League Hall of Famer Teemu Selanne.

SAVE THE DATE

The Friday night lights are trained on Main Street, where the longestrunning car show in O.C. draws


antique autos and restored hot rods every week at 4 p.m. The street becomes a pedestrian promenade featuring classic cars and live music. The city's biggest bash—the Strawberry Festival—takes place on Memorial Day weekend with a parade, rides, and kiddie contests.

LIVE FROM GARDEN GROVE

The town turns up the volume at the 530-seat Garden Amp, which opened in 2019 and hosts punk rock, reggae, and rock acts. For entertainment of a more classical nature, check the marquee at Main Street's The Gem Theatre. The 1920s vaudeville stage is now a live performance venue for local artists producing jukebox musicals, Broadway plays, and holiday shows.

Splurge vs Save

YOU CAN LIVE IT UP OR DIAL IT DOWN IN THIS ORANGE COUNTY BEACH TOWN

A hidden gem on the second floor of a retail plaza, Sushi li offers one of the most luxurious meals in town with three omakase menus (\$150-\$275) and à la carte nigiri that have garnered Michelin Guide recognition.

Get your grab-and-go beach fare at Sancho's Tacos on the Balboa Peninsula. Locals love the Chubby Sauce, which pairs well with carnitas piled onto a soft-fried taco shell (\$4.25).

SHOPPING

The only Neiman Marcus in Orange County is at Fashion Island, an ocean-view center where you can buy a \$19,500 Cosmograph Daytona Rolex at Hyde Park Jewelers or a \$10,780 pair of Jordan 1 Retros at Paired Up.

Stroll Balboa Island's boutiques for souvenirs at Balboa Surf & Style, then treat yourself to some saltwater taffy (\$3.85/quarter-pound) from the bins at Balboa Candy.

Cruise the Newport coast by chartering a 76-foot yacht for 12 (\$7,495) from Captain Newport, VIPs may want to upgrade to the private chef experience (\$1,450).

Park for free in the neighborhoods and hike down to Little Corona Beach. The rocky cove is home to tide pool creatures and gentle waves safe enough for kids to splash and explore.

LODGING

Recharge with a Himalayan salt stone massage (\$275 for 60 minutes) at the spa after checking into The Resort at Pelican Hill, where twobedroom villas (from \$1,195-\$3,000 per night) offer Pacific Ocean views.

Just steps from your tent, RV, or cottage at Newport Dunes (winter rates from \$75), you'll have easy access to the back bay beach and the resort's cozy amenities—including an inflatable aquatic park in the summer.

ART

Ethos Contemporary Art showcases Carolyn Johnson's upcycled surfboards (\$2,900) plus Artlord's pop-art paintings and David Krovblit's cutting-edge collages (\$4,000-\$9,000).

At Seaside Gallery and Goods, browse local artisans' watercolor and acrylic beach scenes (\$50 and up), or attend a workshop in painting, calligraphy, or block-printing.

In 2020, the hotel underwent an extensive restoration, which included the addition of two restaurants, an art gallery, and a library stocked with the books of California literary icons. Nestled below the hotel, guests will also discover The Georgian Room, a restaurant and piano bar once frequented by notables like "Bugsy" Siegel, Clark Gable, and Al Capone. Guest rooms are adorned with gold accents, scalloped headboards, and Polaroid cameras for documenting your trip, all

About a half-mile south, the **Viceroy** Santa Monica recently completed a three-year renovation. With new wellness programming including an outdoor sound-bathing experience and private poolside cabanas, this coastal getaway has completely reinvented itself. Guests are greeted by a large wood-planked ceiling that mirrors the experience of walking beneath the Santa Monica Pier.

A more recent addition to the downtown district is The Pierside, a boutique hotel located just steps from the famous pier. Highlights at this surfinspired getaway include a saltwater pool, beachside restaurant, and full-service gear rental store, The Board Shop. The hotel also features a massive mural by celebrated street artist Shepard Fairey, which pays homage to the city's vibrant surf, skate, and music cultures.

EDITOR'S PICKS

It seems only fitting that L.A.'s first (and only) Mexican-inspired nonalcoholic bar would be located in the heart of uber-trendy Abbot Kinney. Bar Nuda serves handcrafted, zero-proof drinks for the sober, sober-curious, and anyone looking for a booze-free night out.

Follow Pasadena's new Boba Trail located on the historic Route 66. Made up of 30 boba shops, the trail highlights a diverse lineup of coffee and tea shops, each with their own take on the bubbly tapioca-based beverage brought here by Taiwanese immigrants in the 1990s.


Craving a cold one? Head to Hermosa Brewing Company's new Torrance location, where you'll get to choose from 27 craft beers ranging from blueberry sours to red ales and Mexican lagers. The taproom boasts funky murals and an arcade room fitted with pinball machines and vintage video games.



WINE SCENE

The Old Town Newhall district is the best first stop for oenophiles. Hoi Polloi Winery crafts wines from premium grapes sourced at leading West Coast vineyards—taste the results at its Double Trouble Wine Room, which also pours Central Coast wines from Valencia's Pagter Brothers Winery. A block away, Pulchella Winery is the place to discover award-winning Zinfandels and Syrahs from the Paso Robles area. Or if you're looking for a list that spans the globe, check out the selection at the Newhall Press Room, a wine bar and bistro.

Agua Dulce Winery and Reyes Winery cultivate grapes in vineyards about 20 miles northeast of Santa Clarita in a high desert region known for Zinfandel, Cabernet Sauvignon, and Chardonnay. Visit their onsite tasting rooms or stop by Reyes Winery's tasting room and rooftop restaurant in Old Town.

INTO THE OUTDOORS

Trails lead to a hidden waterfall at Placerita Canyon Natural Area. Take a hike through secluded canyons and savor panoramic views from the ridgeline at Ed Davis Park in Towsley Canyon. Or go see why directors have utilized the dramatic sandstone formations at Vasquez Rocks Natural Area and Nature Center to shoot everything from Blazing Saddles to Star Trek: The Original Series.

FILM AND TV

TV and film fanatics will love "set jetting" in Santa Clarita, an extremely busy filming location (it's sometimes called "Hollywood's backlot"). On the Visit Santa Clarita website, a four-day itinerary guides guests to locations featured in Westworld, Justified, Sons of Anarchy, Friends, Parks & Recreation, and dozens more. new roster of chefs has arrived in Ojai, and they are reinvigorating the local dining scene by taking full advantage of the area's bounty. In a building that formerly housed the 1920s-vintage Bill Baker's Ojai Bakery and later Azu Restaurant for more than 20 years, **The Dutchess** is really two dining destinations in one. It was launched by a pair of Ojai transplants, the celebrated husband-and-wife restaurant team of Josh Loeb and baker/cookbook author Zoe Nathan. By day The Dutchess is a bakery and café featuring the creations of pastry chef Kelsey Brito. At night it morphs into a Michelin-starred Burmese restaurant helmed by innovative executive chef Saw Naing. Biryani is Naing's

signature dish-a medley of ground lamb, basmati rice, cashews, and puff pastry. At Rory's Place, sisters Rory and Meave McAuliffe have built relationships with Central Coast ranchers, farmers, and seafood purveyors to source premium ingredients for their Cali-centric menu (the bone-in pork chop over stone fruit panzanella is a summer favorite).

While definitely local, Pinyon Ojai's wood-fired pizzas made with ingredients from area farmers also boast a more global pedigree. Co-owner Jeremy Alben apprenticed at world-renowned Fäviken in Sweden before refining his pizza chops in Brooklyn. Co-owner Tony Montagnaro, too, was pizza born—he comes from a pizzeria-owning family in New Jersey.





FISH

Head out from Morro Bay and troll for bluefin and bonita on the Bluewater Package with Central Coast Fishing Charters (\$600). Or spend the day hooking rockfish with Morro Bay Fishing Charters (\$880 for four people).

Catch surfperch, halibut, and even guitarfish from Pismo Beach Pier, where the fishing is free-no license is required. Cast your line in the early morning or right before sunset for the best chance at hooking whatever swims by.

LOS OLIVOS

Inn at Mattei's **Tavern**

In the heart of Los Olivos, the Inn at Mattei's Tavern embodies the history and evolution of the Santa Ynez Valley. The resort is named for Felix Mattei, who, back in the days when Los Olivos was along the main route between San Francisco and Los Angeles, operated a stagecoach stop and railway inn called the Central Hotel. It quickly gained a reputation as a fine-dining destination and later operated as a speakeasy during Prohibition. Then, following the rise of the surrounding wine region, the inn housed a series of acclaimed restaurants.

But the inn is not just an exercise in nostalgia. Rejuvenate with a spa treatment, or take part in one of the inn's complimentary movement classes at The Cottage Spa. The Tavern, the inn's restaurant, carries on the tradition of ranchinspired cuisine in dishes made with produce from Mattei's garden and nearby farms.

Dating back to 1886, this luxurious 6.5-acre resort blends the property's Old West heritage with contemporary country style. Highlights include rustic-chic cottage rooms, a restaurant serving ranch-inspired cuisine, and a state-of-the-art spa.





akersfield knows its beer. In a town celebrated for honky-tonks and the eponymous musical sound made famous by Buck Owens and Merle Haggard, craft beer holds an honored place.

Discover the best of the city's breweries by following the Bakersfield Kern County Brewery Trail, a driving route that travels to 12 craft beer hot spots in and around town.

At Great Change Brewing, patrons kick back in a lofty warehouse space, play cornhole on the patio, sip pale and blonde ales, and nab meals from food trucks parked out front. Less than two miles away, Dionysus Brewing is celebrated for sours like the Super Funkadelic, a gose-styled ale brewed with coriander and sea salt. Lengthwise Brewing Company operates three Bakersfield locations, including one near Cal State University Bakersfield. The chain's hearty menu is a major draw-burgers, tri-tip sandwiches, and fish tacos are served alongside popular beers like the Zeus Imperial Ale, a refreshing, unfiltered brew.

Traditionalists will appreciate Crusader Brewing's Guy Fawkes Yorkshire Old Ale. More adventurous drinkers should try Temblor Brewing Company's Blood Orange Belgian Wit or Ruby's Boysenberry Cobbler Kettle Sour. The tart, fruit-forward brew won a gold medal at the 2022 U.S. Beer Open.

For a sip of the Old West, drive an hour northeast to Kernville's Kern River Brewing Company, which has two locations serving pub grub by the brewery's namesake river. After a day of whitewater rafting or hiking, nothing tastes better than a blonde or red ale with a plate of calamari and a tall pile of waffle fries.

EDITOR'S PICKS



TASTE THE CENTRAL VALLEY'S BOUNTY IN WINTERS. A SMALL TOWN WITH A BIG REPUTATION FOR FOOD AND WINE

Established in 1875 on the banks of Putah Creek, this Yolo County community has a National Historic Register-listed Main Street lined with late 19th- and early 20thcentury buildings. The exteriors are vintage, but inside those aging brick and stone structures is a surprisingly contemporary culinary scene. Winters' chefs take full advantage of this fertile region's farms, ranches, vineyards, and artisanal food purveyors to create meals that are well worth a detour.

RESTAURANTS

Plenty of people make the 30-mile drive from Sacramento just for breakfast at Putah Creek Café, where favorites include thick-sliced brioche French toast (best with a

side of applewood bacon), carnitas huevos rancheros, or fried chicken on a buttermilk waffle.

Across Main Street in a onetime hotel that dates back to 1889, the famed Buckhorn Steakhouse fires up prime-certified Angus beef that's been aged 60-plus days and broiled at 1,500 degrees for juiciness.

One block over, Preserve Public House serves organic fried chicken, Moroccan braised short rib, and cioppino swimming with rock cod, lobster, and shellfish.

At popular Ficelle, the tapas selection includes not only Spanishstyle small plates like gambas al ajillo (garlic shrimp), but also dishes inspired by Mexican classics, like stuffed chile relleno and tinga de pollo.

WINE AND SPECIALTY FOODS

With its handful of downtown tasting rooms, Winters is a hasslefree place to discover Yolo County's wines. Sample estate wines from Berryessa Gap Vineyards, including its acclaimed Albariño, while listening to live music in a rusticchic tasting room. A short walk away, Turkovich Family Wines is celebrated for its Rhône varietals and sparkling wines.

At Patio29 Spirits Company, you can taste handcrafted bourbon, gin, vodka, rum, or brandy and take a tour of the distillery. Or book an appointment for olive-oil tasting at Bondolio, makers of a Sicilian estate blend that scored top honors at the 2023 NYIOOC World Olive Oil Competition.










orthstar California's cross-country center manager, Aaron Pearlman, loves all snow sports equally. "Alpine skiing and snowboarding are great, but not everybody likes to slide downhill. There's a snow sport that's right for everybody," says the 40-year veteran of the ski industry. Here are Pearlman's recommendations on where to find non-vertical fun:

YOSEMITE CROSS-COUNTRY CENTER

"Badger Pass' trail system is extensive. Beginners can learn to ski on Glacier Point Road; more advanced skiers can make the all-day trip to Glacier Point, where there's a view of Half Dome and Yosemite Valley."

NORTHSTAR CROSS-COUNTRY, TELEMARK, AND SNOWSHOE CENTER

"The cross-country center is Northstar's untapped secret. We offer rentals and lessons for Nordic skiing, snowshoeing, telemark skiing, and fat-tire biking. Even on their first day, beginners can ski, snowshoe,

or pedal to the caboose, our old railroad car next to a warming hut. Intermediates can go another one and a half miles to an iconic overlook of Lake Tahoe."

KIRKWOOD CROSS-COUNTRY **SKI AND SNOWSHOE CENTER**

"Kirkwood and Northstar are the only two California resorts where you can rent fattire bikes. Kirkwood's large, flat meadow is also great for learning to skate ski."

TAMARACK CROSS-COUNTRY SKI CENTER

"Tamarack has beginner terrain near Twin Lakes in the Mammoth Lakes Basin, and it's a beautiful place to learn cross-country skiing or snowshoeing. You can head out for a few hours, or you can have a real immersion experience by spending the night at Tamarack Lodge, an old-school lodge with a big fireplace room."

EDITOR'S PICKS

Whatever comes out of East Side Bake Shop's oven is worth its caloric price, from dark chocolate spice cookies to Meyer lemon bars and blackberry bread pudding. Find the bakery at McGee Creek Lodge, 30 miles north of Bishop.

At Yosemite Valley's new Welcome Center, park rangers and volunteers help visitors plan their trips. The 3,000-squarefoot building replaces the Valley Visitor Center that has operated since 1967. Located much closer to the valley's central parking lot, the center features educational displays, restrooms, and a 20,000-square-foot outdoor plaza.

Near Sequoia National Park, stop in to Three Rivers for new-wave diner food alongside the Kaweah River. Buckaroo Diner serves crispy Brussels sprouts, kale Caesar salad, and vegan burgers.



ADVENTURE FUEL

Start your day with nutritionpacked avocado toast at Pupfish Café or an egg sandwich at Great Basin Bakery. Or fill up on buttery carbs at Bishop's two bakeries, Great Basin and Erick Schat's. For lunch, pick up jackfruit tacos at Mercado Mexico or brawny sandwiches at Mahogany Smoked Meats.

To cap off a day of adventure, join the locals for award-winning ales at Mountain Rambler Brewery or artisan cocktails at Owens Valley Distillery. Dinner might be brisket sandwiches at 1903 Taphouse, steaks at Back Alley Bowl and Grill, or St. Louis-style ribs at Aaron Schat's Roadhouse. Or switch out your hiking boots for sandals and head to Molcajetes Fusion for shrimp, steak, chiles, and nopales served in a volcanic stone bowl.

PLAY OUTDOORS

Bishop is the gateway to the John Muir Wilderness, so pick from a wealth of hikes leading to glacially carved lakes. Your car does the climbing to reach 9,000 feet at South Lake, where you hop out and walk: A 3-mile hike leads to sparkling Treasure Lakes, and a 5-mile trek delivers amazing Sierra views at the top of Bishop Pass. If you'd rather ride than hike, the trusty steeds at Rainbow Pack Outfitters will take you on day trips to mountain meadows and vistas.

A few miles away on Bishop Creek's Middle Fork, beguiling Lake Sabrina is backed by 13,000foot peaks. Admire the views from the aspen-clad shoreline, or rent a kayak or canoe at Lake Sabrina Boat Landing. Anglers troll the lake for rainbow and brook trout.


To pump up your adrenaline, pedal a mountain bike through the Tungsten Hills, rock climb in the Owens River Gorge, or scramble up the Buttermilks' quartz monzonite boulders. crop of new places to drink in the capital city offer some surprising twists. Flashback to the 1970s at the **Butterscotch Den**, a supper clubstyle restaurant where cooking your own sirloin is the only way to dine. Select your main-course meat, and it's delivered raw for you to grill to ideal doneness. (Choose sauces and seasoning, too-and don't skip the chimichurri.) Add sides, like garlic bread, potato salad, or a prawn cocktail. Vegetarians can grill their own portobello sandwich or veggie skewers. The retro restaurant sets the vibe with funky wallpaper and a mirrored back bar, then channels that energy into its drink menu, offering hip, throwback cocktails. Try a freezer martini with 50/50 gin and dry vermouth; add caviar for a few extra bucks.

At Betty, a grown-up bar and bottle shop in Southside Park, pair sandwiches and snacky bar bites with wine by the glass or bottle. Or sample the smoked specialty cocktails and tropical drinks at the equestrian-themed Tack Room in Midtown. At **Star Lounge**, drink like it's yesteryear at the Masonic women's meeting place reborn as a moody third-floor cocktail bar. Sip an Old Fashioned or a Manhattan and enjoy views of Sutter's Fort.

A few miles away in Rancho Cordova, the fast-growing Barrel District houses six breweries (including one that specializes in hard kombucha), two distilleries, a meadery, and a wine bar. In Elk Grove, Prost Beer Hall serves German and local beers with jumbo pretzels and sausage platters at its Old Town biergarten.





LEARN ABOUT THE PAST

See why Sonora was nicknamed "Queen of the Southern Mines" by strolling charming Washington Street, where buildings that date back to the city's founding still stand. One such structure is the Sonora Opera Hall, which hosts town events. To see exhibits on Native American culture and the Gold Rush, visit the Tuolumne County Museum & History Research Center in the old county jail. Just beyond Sonora, find Columbia State Historic Park, a preserved Gold Rush town with stagecoach rides, shops, and eateries.

GOLD COUNTRY EATS

Snag a patio table at El Jardin and fill up on margaritas paired with bottomless chips and salsa and the mole-topped chicken enchiladas. Or find hearty red-sauce pasta dishes and oven-baked Italian sandwiches at family-owned Pinocchio, first

opened in the 1950s. Love food trails? Follow the Tuolumne County Craft Burger Trail to The Armory for a burger in its beer garden, or taste The Standard Pour's Kobe beef burger at its historic location in the Pickering Lumber Company office.

SIP LOCAL

Wake up with Tuolumne-roasted beans at Revive Coffee. When happy hour calls, step back to the Gold Rush era at Servente's Saloon. In Sonora's oldest bar, a frosty craft brew pairs perfectly with Old West architecture. For more modern libations, sip a Trailblazer IPA at Sonora Brewing Company, the first brewery in Sonora to open since 1907. Find 20 beers on tap at the Sonora Tap Room, or pair wine with small plates at The Independent Wine Co. Pack a picnic to enjoy with organic hard apple cider and brandy at Indigeny Reserve's beautiful orchard.

OUTDOOR ADVENTURES

Sonora may be best known for its proximity to Yosemite, but it has great outdoor experiences right in town. Hike Dragoon Gulch's three miles of pathways for a peaceful stroll through leafy oaks. For underground excitement, head to nearby Moaning Caverns Adventure Park, where guided tours down a spiral staircase lead to a cavern 165 feet below the earth's surface.


Holbrooke Hotel

Steeped in California history, the Holbrooke Hotel has played host to five U.S. presidents, writers Mark Twain and Bret Harte, dancer Lola Montez, and a cabal of bona fide bandits and bootleggers. After a multiyear restoration, this 1862 gem reopened in 2020 and has fast become a boutique favorite.

The redesigned hotel retains its Gold Rush heritage while dazzling with 28 modern, one-of-a-kind rooms. Vintage fixtures and furnishings blend with contemporary comforts like Bluetooth speakers and fluffy spa robes. For special occasions, book a King Suite with a clawfoot tub, double-headed walk-in shower, and downtown views from the balcony.

The Holbrooke's Golden Gate Saloon—one of the West's longest operating watering holes—harks back to the Victorian era with copper-clad walls, ornate mirrors, and an original mahogany bar gleaming with marble and stained glass. Order a meal of rabbit mole or braised short rib, then slip downstairs to The Iron Door. Order a classy cocktail while you listen to live jazz at this stonewalled speakeasy with a wooden ceiling, plush banquettes, and metal doors that once opened to secret underground tunnels.

The Holbrooke's sister property, the National Exchange Hotel in Nevada City, is an equally stunning Gold Rush revamp just four miles away. Book a stay in one of 38 well-appointed rooms or dine at European-inspired Lola.






an Jose is known for innovation, says Michael Ogilvie, "but you can't have innovation without creativity, and the city's creativity is out there on the streets and on the walls.

As San Jose's public art director, Ogilvie credits a collection of organizations including Empire Seven Studios, the San Jose Downtown Association, Local Color, and the city's Cultural Affairs department for sponsoring the city's 150-plus murals.

"There's a shared responsibility and interest in beautifying San Jose," Ogilvie says. "There are a lot of creative people here, and not everybody creates with binary code."

In 2023, artist Taylor Reinhold painted Malama 'Aina, a tribute to Pacific Islander culture, on an exterior wall of Pono Hawaiian Grill on North Market Street. The project was managed by Sarah Billings of the San Jose Downtown Association, who watched as the

artist and his crew brought the mural to life.

"People were walking by, asking questions, and engaging with the art," Billings says. "Everyone asked about the title, which means 'take care of the land.'

Another of Billings' projects was Our Offering, a SoFA District mural honoring two young San Jose organ donors. It features a hummingbird and lotería cards.

One of Ogilvie's favorite murals is Mona Caron's Limonium, which brightens the San Jose McEnery Convention Center. The painting depicts "flora that is often neglected in an urban environment, like small little flowers that break through a crack in the concrete."

You could see it as a metaphor, Ogilvie says. "The city has a culture of treating the streetscape as a possibility for creation."





RESTAURANTS

Northern California's bounty meets Southern comfort food in a hip, buzzy atmosphere at Easy Rider. The menu features upscale renditions of classics like fried chicken with collard greens and shrimp 'n' grits.

Sonoma County produce stars at Luma Bar & Eatery, set in an open, contemporary space with a riverfront patio. Dishes lean toward Mediterranean with a California twist—the pastas are a standout and the drink menu highlights natural wines and craft cocktails.

TIKI BAR

Decked out with hand-carved Balinese tiki sculptures, colorful paper lanterns, and a massive, thatched-roofed bar, Kapu owes its escapist interiors to legendary SoCal tiki bar designer Ben Bassham, aka

"Bamboo Ben." The not-overly-sweet tropical drinks are as delicious as they look, especially when paired with Kapu's flavorful Asian- and island-inspired bites.

WINE TASTING

A century-old building that originally housed a Studebaker dealership has been reinvented as Brooks Note tasting room. Flights of Pinot Noir and Chardonnay include a sampling of local charcuterie. Barber Cellars and Black Knight Vineyards also have downtown tasting rooms.

RECORD STORES

After selling records in Boulder, Colorado, for 30 years, the owners of Paradise Found opened a second shop in Petaluma. Rock, jazz, punk—they have it all, plus

turntables for vinyl newbies. Three former bandmates opened another music mecca, Rain Dog Records, in 2021. Shelves are packed with hard-to-find cassettes and CDs plus vintage albums from Patsy Cline and the New York Dolls.

HOME AND GARDEN GOODS

Take home a potted succulent or houseplant from Flourish, or stock up on heritage tomato and cucumber seeds and daffodil bulbs at Petaluma Seed Bank.

For unique household goods, peruse Ceto Home's block-printed pillows and cloth napkins made from sustainable textiles. The Find carries vintage furniture and home decor like 1970s stoneware and 1980s collectibles. Pick up bulk bath and cleaning products and other low-waste items at Refill Mercantile.

72 Hours in Napa Valley

Napa Valley stretches 30 miles north to south, with many distinctive towns and experiences to discover in between. This tour hits the highlights, from the buzzy town of Napa to quirky and cool Calistoga.


NAPA

Start in Napa, a vibrant city full of trendy tasting rooms, boutiques, and restaurants. After fueling up on chilaquiles or pillowy pancakes at Grace's Table, rent a bicycle or e-bike at Napa Valley Bike Shop and take a scenic pedal to Yountville on the car-free Napa Valley Vine Trail. Recharge over French bistro fare at Michelin-starred Bouchon, then stroll Washington Street to explore shops, tasting rooms, and the Yountville Art Walk sculpture tour.

Pedal back to Napa and spend the afternoon browsing the riverfront shops. For a vinous pickme-up with a vinyl soundtrack, visit Benevolent Neglect Wines. Next, head to dinner at Compline, celebrated for its unpretentious wine list and the best burger in town. Settle in for the night at the blissfully remote Poetry Inn or the hip, urban-style Andaz.

ST. HELENA

Make your way up the valley to St. Helena, which boasts a blend of small-town charm and city sophistication. Begin at Model



Bakery on boutique-rich Main Street for pastries or a breakfast sandwich made with one of their legendary English muffins.

Next, set out for Spottswoode Estate Vineyard and Winery to sample organic Cabernet Sauvignon. Continue tasting at Faust, a restored Victorian mansion with a stunning modern aesthetic. A farm-to-table lunch is just five minutes away at Farmstead at Long Meadow Ranch, a casual spot that showcases homegrown produce, beef, and wines from the ranch.

When you're ready to chill, check in at the elegant Alila Napa Valley, which is perfectly situated among the vines. Dine at Goose & Gander, set in a 1920s Craftsman bungalow, and order anything from the woodfired oven.

Day 3: CALISTOGA

Drive north to laid-back Calistoga, famous for its mud baths and mineral spas. Splurge on the plush Four Seasons Resort, which includes a working winery, or stay at one of the downtown hotelspa resorts that are also known for their restaurants, like Sam's Social Club at Indian Springs Resort & Spa, or SolBar at the upscale Solage Resort & Spa are both great. Check out eclectic shops along Lincoln Avenue, like Blackbird, a California-centric home decor and kitchenware boutique. Toast your excellent taste, and cap off your three-day stay, with a flight of five sparkling wines at Schramsberg.





he only way to sip a cocktail at the outdoor speakeasy Glen Blair Bar is to travel by train from Fort Bragg in Mendocino County. And not just any train—you need a ticket for the historic Skunk Train, which has been chugging along the tracks since 1885.

Choose a leather seat in the club car or post up on the open-air deck, then kick back for a leisurely 25-minute ride along the Pudding Creek Estuary, across trestle bridges, and into the Noyo River canyon's redwood groves. The Skunk Train once carried logs from the inland forest to coastal sawmills and ports, but today's passengers snap selfies and admire the scenery.

When you see twinkling string lights up ahead, prepare to disembark at the woodsy oasis of Glen Blair Bar, a rustic encampment hugged by stately redwoods. Stroll into the pole-barn pavilion and order a Skunk Beer Amber Ale or signature cocktail, then join the patrons mingling by the firepits and listening to live music. The weather may be warm and sunny or damp and drizzly, but this forested watering hole always feels cozy.

The adults-only bar comes to life on Friday and select Saturday nights from 6:30 to 10:30 p.m. (check the online calendar). Leashed dogs can join the fun.

EDITOR'S PICKS

Next door to Mendocino's Café Beaujolais, the Nicholson House is an updated 1904 Victorian with six rooms decked out in handcrafted furniture. Reserve Suite 7 for sweeping ocean views.

The New Museum isn't a repository of history or art. It's a new brewery in Point Arena's oldest building, where brewmasters Peter McDowell and Rose Walterbach craft Belgian ales and hopforward IPAs.

At Dancing Crow Vineyards' new Hopland tasting room, guests sip wine, nosh on charcuterie boards, and play cornhole on an expansive courtyard with views of the green Mayacamas Mountains.

Satisfy cravings for Malaysian curry and steamed dumplings at Ukiah's City of Ten Thousand Buddhas. Jyun Kang Vegetarian Restaurant has reopened after a three-year closure.

















48 Hours in Humboldt **County**

This northwest California county is famous for magnificent redwoods, but its human history is fascinating, too. This trip is a peek into the lives of North Coast people, from the Native American tribes who fished and hunted on this remote coast to the sailors, gold-seekers, and lumber barons who followed.

EUREKA

Start at the Clarke Historical Museum, where you'll learn about Humboldt Bay's sailing heritage, the "Red Gold Rush" lumber boom, and Native American basketry. Next, take a self-guided walking tour of Old Town's waterfront, a cluster of coffeehouses, bookstores, and galleries housed in historic buildings. More than 60 percent of Eureka's architecture dates back to the Victorian era of water-glass windows, hand-milled woodwork, and ornamental details. Learn how these ornate features are made at Blue Ox Millworks Living History Park, where master craftspeople use vintage machinery to create architectural pieces that replicate 1800s originals.

Head to lunch at the Buhne Building, an 1884 Italianate structure made for the first European sea captain to sail into Humboldt Bay. Behind the Buhne's stately windows, Humboldt Bay Provisions serves local oysters,



bread, olives, beer, and wine. Stroll over to M Street to the fabulous Carson Mansion, a four-story masterpiece built for lumber baron William Carson. This monument to 1880s gingerbread is still the most photographed building in town. Across the street, The Pinc Lady, an 1889 Queen Anne Victorian, glows with Barbie-pink splendor. Now a hotel and event space, the mansion was built as a wedding gift for Carson's son. Climb the curved staircase to the Turret Room, then spend a restful night among velvet furnishings and floor-to-ceiling windows.

FORTUNA & SCOTIA

Drive 18 miles south to the Fortuna Depot Museum in

Rohner Park. This restored 1893 Northwestern Pacific depot houses historic bric-a-brac: vintage fishing poles, typewriters, barbed wire, and more. If you're not in a rush, drop by Eel River Brewing Co.'s bustling pub and order an Emerald Triangle IPA.

Continue southward to Scotia, one of the West's longest-running company-owned towns. The Pacific Lumber Company built it in 1869, and its residents worked at logging operations until 2008. Stop in for a hearty burger at the Scotia Lodge, a 1923 charmer that still retains its art deco glory.

On your trip back, take a walk around Fort Humboldt State Historic Park, perched on a bluff overlooking Humboldt Bay. Established in 1853, the fort's most famous resident was Ulysses S. Grant, who briefly served as captain 15 years before becoming the 18th U.S. president.

Shasta Bike Depot:

In May 2023, the nonprofit Shasta Living Streets opened the Shasta Bike Depot with a fleet of 70 electric bikes, an outdoor courtyard with restaurants, and 120 docking stations scattered around Redding. Riders can hop on a bike to cruise along the Sacramento River Trail or join a guided e-bike educational tour.

Bike Shasta:

The Mount Shasta Mountain Biking Association, aka Bike Shasta, is building

new trails in Shasta Trinity National Forest. Already completed: The Gateway Trail System near Mt. Shasta City has a 10-mile trail network through a ponderosa pine forest that delivers spectacular mountain views. Another 46 miles of trails are in the works.

Shuttles, tours, coaching: Shasta Gravity Adventures offers shuttle rides for mountain bikers tackling the Sisson-Callahan National Recreation Trail near Mt. Eddy or Mt. Shasta's 10 Gallon Trail. Guides also lead half-day tours and offer private coaching.

Lost Sierra Route:

Greg Williams, a Downieville mountainbiking pioneer and founder of the Sierra Buttes Trail Stewardship, has a big plan: to build a 600-mile trail network that links 15 mountain towns, from Westwood to Truckee. Scheduled to be completed by 2030, the Lost Sierra Route will welcome mountain bikers. e-bikers, hikers, and equestrians.

Mt. Shasta **Mountain Bike**

Park: This wintertime ski hill becomes a bike park in summer. Ten miles of chairliftaccessed trails boast smooth rollers and twisting descents. After your ride, take advantage of outdoor showers and the Bigfoot Snack Shack.

EDITOR'S PICKS

Order a mimosa flight and sip fruity bubbles at Redding's Branch House Riverfront Bistro, which is situated alongside the Sundial Bridge and the Sacramento River.

At Oroville's Live Vine Vineyard, Shawn and Susan Smith run a microwinery that produces only 300 cases a year. But when the bottling season ends, the couple makes carbonated meads, hard ciders, and agave seltzers under their Smith House label.

A petite yellow cottage in Mt. Shasta City houses Crave, where hungry hikers and climbers fuel up on street tacos, tri-tip sandwiches, and 17-hour slow-smoked brisket.

In Yreka's historic downtown, vinyl records play and baristas bustle at Zephyr Books and Coffee, a community hub packed to the rafters with \$5 used books. Pull something intriguing from the stacks and sit down with a latte to read.

Fifth-generation farmers Bill and Kristin Weller use their rice and wheat crops to make Farmers Brewing Company beers. Try their cold-fermented Farmers Light Lager or Sun Up 'Til Sun Down West Coast IPA at their Princeton and Chico taprooms.



FEW THINGS ARE AS RELAXING AS TIME SPENT ON THE WATER, WHETHER YOU'RE WAKEBOARDING, PADDLING, FISHING, OR SLEEPING ON A HOUSEBOAT



California's largest reservoir reigns as the state's boating capital. Shasta Lake's numbers tell all: 30,000 surface acres of water, 370 miles of shoreline, eight full-service marinas, six public boat ramps, and more than a dozen campgrounds. You can wakeboard or water-ski, fish for 20 different species, sleep on a houseboat, or plan a date night with Lake Shasta Dinner Cruises.

LEWISTON LAKE, WEAVERVILLE

This serene body of water is one of California's best fly-fishing lakes, popular with anglers casting from float tubes. Even if you don't catch a trout, you might see a bald eagle nab one. A 10-mile-per-hour speed limit keeps the water quiet for kayaks and canoes.

WHISKEYTOWN LAKE, REDDING

This five-mile-long lake is so

clear, you can see 30 feet below its surface. Give it a try by peering over the edge of a sailboat, kayak, paddleboard, or windsurfer. The Redding Yacht Club offers sailing lessons, park rangers lead kayak and SUP trips, and two marinas rent boats and watercraft.

LAKE SISKIYOU, MT. SHASTA CITY

Nestled at the foot of the Trinity Divide, this lake has warm water for swimming, miles of sandy shoreline, and plentiful trout. Lake Siskiyou Resort rents kayaks, paddleboards, and party barges. Bring the kids for a day of swimming or camp overnight.

EAGLE LAKE, SUSANVILLE

The state's second-largest natural lake has more than 100 miles of shoreline and a special fish, the Eagle Lake rainbow trout. These fierce fighters grow as large as nine

pounds and can rip all the line from your reel. The lake has bountiful bird life, too, including bald eagles, osprey, and grebes.

BUCKS LAKE, OUINCY


Hang out at your cabin at Lakeshore Resort, camp under towering pines, or rent a boat and explore Bucks Lake's clear waters. Anglers know this mountain lake as a top-notch trout water filled with trophy-sized rainbows, browns, kokanee, and mackinaw. But if you're not into fishing, it's also an idyllic spot to lounge on the shoreline.

LAKE ALMANOR, CHESTER

Satisfy your need for speed at this shallow, warm lake. Fifty-plus miles of shoreline, splendid views of Lassen Peak, and warm summer water temps create ideal conditions for water-skiing, wakeboarding, and revved-up boating.




