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
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Ride the Rails



TIME TRAVEL THROUGH THESE PORTALS TO WEST VIRGINIA'S PAST.

Visit West Virginia's birthplace— Independence Hall in Wheeling. Originally a federal custom house, the 1859 structure hosted key events in the state's creation.

Fly back into history on a vintage World War II Stearman biplane at Wild Blue Adventure Company in Fayetteville. Aerobatics optional.



Descend into the depths of the Cold War era at The Greenbrier Bunker in White Sulphur Springs,

once a top-secret fallout shelter

for Congress.



Rekindle the romance of train travel—including fine dining on Romney's Potomac Eagle Scenic Railroad.



Look up at the highest state capitol dome in the United States on a walking tour of the West Virginia State Capitol grounds in Charleston.

See bullet holes in the building where miners battled coal company agents.

It's now across the street from the West Virginia Mine Wars Museum in Matewan. Then glide down the Tug Fork River via Hatfield and McCoy Airboat Tours.

Experience early pioneer life in Appalachia

by touring a re-created frontier village at Heritage Farm Museum and Village in Huntington.



Drive the Coal Heritage Trail through 13 counties

in southern West Virginia to appreciate the importance of mining in state history.




Weigh evidence of Aaron Burr's (alleged) treason

Every December, the Victorian Homes Christmas Tour and Tea takes over Julia-Ann Square, showcasing houses decked for the season.

Julia-Ann Square Historic District

Ornate gables and intricate ironwork are among the architectural details you'll spot strolling the state's largest and oldest residential historic district, in Parkersburg.

Fairmont

Try your hand at 18th-century living while walking around Prickett's Fort State Park, or tag along for the town's annual celebration of its Italian-American heritage during Feast of the Seven Fishes.

Harpers Ferry

While touring this historic hillside town overlooking the Potomac and Shenandoah rivers, amble through streets where abolitionist John Brown launched his ill-fated raid. Recap the day over lunch and stock up on sweets at True Treats Historic Candy.

Shepherdstown

You don't have to be a Shepherd University Ram to revel in this buzzy college town's homegrown charm. But hop between the locally owned bakeries, bookstores, gift shops and gourmet grocers that line German Street, Shepherdstown's bustling thoroughfare, and you might just want to enroll.

Bramwell

Coal has powered the Mountain State's economy for generations, and it helped build the spectacular coal barons' mansions that line this Mercer County town's Millionaire Row. See the sprawling estates on a walking tour along the leafy, brick street.

Light Up the Night

AFTER THE SUN SETS BEHIND THOSE LEGENDARY MOUNTAINS, START ANOTHER ADVENTURE WITH LIVE EVENTS, REGIONAL SIPS AND GAMING RESORTS.

TAKE IN A SHOW

Enjoy an outdoor drama from **Theatre West Virginia** at Grandview's Cliffside Amphitheatre in New River Gorge National Park and Preserve. Look up at **Keith-Albee Performing Arts Center** in Huntington—you don't want to miss the night skyscape adorning its ceiling. **Apollo Civic Theatre** has brought entertainment to Martinsburg for more than a century.



DRINK LOCAL

Morgantown Brewing Company, the oldest operating brewery in the state, releases new flavors every few weeks. If you see Parkersburg Brewing Company's Cell Block 304 on draft, avail yourself of an awardwinning pour. If wine is more your style, Daniel Vineyards boasts 15 varieties of cold-weather cultivars, which results in pours like the bestselling Sweet R&B Wine. For something stronger, Gilbert's Hatfield and McCoy Moonshine uses the same method and recipe once used by Devil Anse Hatfield himself, while Smooth Ambler Spirits in Maxwelton blends old and new.

ROLL THE DICE

A spin through The Casino **Club** at The Greenbrier in White Sulphur Springs, the state's only private casino, conjures up the sophistication of an older time, and gaming is only part of the draw. At **Hollywood Casino at Charles** Town Races, thoroughbred horse races offer an adrenaline-filled precursor to a night with Lady Luck at 74 table games. Live music and fine dining round out the roll of dice at Mardi Gras Casino and Resort in Cross Lanes, Make it a weekend at Mountaineer Casino, Racetrack and Resort in New Cumberland and book a suite to enjoy more than 1,000 slot machines. Extend your Northern Panhandle getaway into the evening at Wheeling Island Hotel-Casino-Racetrack.

Alfresco Eats

The Forks Inn ELKINS

Executive chef Eric Stalnaker crafts every seasonal dish from scratch for elevated cuisine complemented by mountain views. Choose from a curated list of options or go for the six-course tasting menu culminating in desserts such as Apple Pecan Cake, with vanilla ginger Chantilly.



WEST VIRGINIA FOOD TRUCK FESTIVAL, Eleanor Bring a big appetite to the Eleanor Park and Fairgrounds in spring, when the region's food trucks offer a variety of flavors from around the globe.

The Wonder Bar Steakhouse CLARKSBURG

While the sprawling patio and firepit weren't around when this fine-dining destination opened in 1946, some things have thankfully stayed the same: tender ribeyes, a deep list of fine wines, and the views of Harrison County's hills and valleys.

Blue Moon Cafe

A backyard garden shaded by towering trees and oversize umbrellas lends enchanted forest vibes to this deli-style establishment. Traditional Reubens and French dips join more unique crab cake sandwiches and Cajun-seasoned burgers.

Poncho and Lefty's BECKLEY

Over the years, this taco truck became so popular it required a brick-and-mortar location to keep up with demand. Now you can enjoy The Poncho (fried fish taco), The Lefty (fried chicken taco) and other Baja-style eats from atop a converted service station. IÎ

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


Highland Scenic Highway POTOMAC HIGHLANDS

This National Scenic Byway follows state routes WV-39 and WV-150 through the Monongahela National Forest, with Richwood at its western end and US-219, just north of Marlinton, at its eastern end. Nature-lovers and leaf peepers can savor sweeping mountain and valley views from four scenic overlooks and stretch their legs while hiking from several trailheads. Don't miss the Cranberry Mountain Nature Center, where the two state routes intersect. It's an ideal jumping-off point for exploring the Cranberry Glades Botanical Area. **DISTANCE 43 miles**

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Washington Heritage Trail National Scenic Byway EASTERN PANHANDLE

Travelers making their way through Almost Heaven via this looping National Scenic Byway will discover 18th-century towns; 19th-century industrial sites; postcard-worthy views of the Shenandoah, Potomac and Cacapon rivers; and plenty of opportunities to follow in George Washington's footsteps, to name just a few highlights. You can enter the trail at Harpers Ferry before passing through three counties and five towns. It features 48 official stops, including railroad landmarks and Civil War sites, plus pristine parks and wildlife areas. **DISTANCE** 136 miles



Midland Trail Scenic Highway METRO VALLEY AND NEW RIVER/ **GREENBRIER VALLEY**

Swap the interstate for something more picturesque: the Midland Trail Scenic Highway, bookended by buzzing Huntington and Kenova to the west and bucolic Greenbrier County to the east. This National Scenic Byway follows WV-60 to prime spots for adventure. Take in the arts in Charleston. Go fishing, whitewater rafting and rock climbing in Fayette County. And explore peaceful farms, historic sites, and charming towns such as Lewisburg and White Sulphur Springs.

DISTANCE 180 miles





Coal Heritage Trail NEW RIVER/ GREENBRIER VALLEY

This scenic road winds its way through five counties in southern West Virginia, beginning along US-52 in Bluefield, continuing northwest to Welch, and following WV-16 north to Ansted. Drivers can soak up the legacy of coal mining in the Mountain State, passing by remnants of the industry's heyday and stopping at heritage wayside

exhibits along the way. In Beckley, situated roughly midway between the trail's northern and southern ends, stop at **Beckley Exhibition Coal** Mine for a stroll through a re-created camp and an underground tour with a former miner as your guide.

STONE HOUSE

From its winding rows of purple buds, you'd never guess this Fairmont farm was once the site of surface mining common to West Virginia. The siblings behind Stone House Lavender have transformed their family land into a serene space with live events, such as yoga in the flower fields. Tour the working farm, pick your own stems or find a lavenderinfused treasure from the market.

OPPOSITE

Stone House Lavender opened in 2017, but the land has been in the family for eight generations.

POWDER KEG FARMS

This heritage farm celebrates 300 years of farming tradition with practices grounded in "the new old way." Curious what that means? Roll up your sleeves and learn firsthand. The High View farm participates in an organic farming education exchange program that gives you the chance to stay and work the land in an up-close experience.

HERNSHAW FARMS

The humble mushroom takes on a noble purpose at Hernshaw Farms. See how the trendy restaurant staple gets its start on a tour with owner George Patterson, whose mission is to support the people of Appalachia with access to fresh food and to sustain the environment: Spent organic growing material is composted to help reclaim more mining land for farming in Kanawha County.

FAMILY ROOTS FARM

There's a sweetness in the air of this revived family farm—especially come February when the maple trees are tapped for syrup making. The award-winning pancake topper isn't the only natural treat produced here: Come spring, the Wellsburg farm becomes a popular destination for U-pick strawberries. Keep an eye out for special events and tours on-site.



J.Q. DICKINSON SALT-WORKS

The ancient ocean under the Appalachian Mountains gets a second life as sought-after artisanal salt, hand-harvested for 200 years by the same family at this Malden farm. Tour the grounds to see the gleaming stretches of salty treasure spring to fall, or have a taste during farm-to-table dining events throughout the year. ഗ

HUNTINGTON

This college town on the Ohio River boasts a thriving arts and culture community. Start with the Huntington Museum of Art, home to 10 exhibit spaces, the only tropical and subtropical plant conservatory in the state, and hiking trails on 52 acres of wooded land. Shop a variety of works from local artists,

including ceramics, jewelry and fine arts at The Red Caboose, then see how Blenko **Glass Company** brings handblown designs to life in nearby Milton. Keep your ears open for the sound of the **Huntington Symphony** Orchestra—it regularly plays at Keith-Albee Theatre and outdoor venues in town.



THOMAS The mountain town of Thomas was once a bustling hub of coal production, but has been reborn as one of Tucker County's prime sources of culture. The epitome of this renaissance can be found in the 1900s-era building that was once a mining company store and now serves as studio space for artists as the **Buxton and Landstreet Gallery and Studios.** Tread on the wilder side at **Invisible**, an artist-run gallery that specializes in the unusual. Browse an eclectic collection of work by Thomas-based artists to find a piece that's sure to be a conversation starter. In nearby Davis, **WVHighlands Artisans Gallery** is the home base of a dedicated group of juried artists who showcase a wide variety of mediums, including painting, pottery, woodworking, welding, jewelry and more. FARM-T0-TABLE



LEWISBURG

Festivals, live music and an innovative culinary scene bring this classic small town to life, but start at the beginning with a walking tour hosted by the **North House Museum.** The keeper of Greenbrier Valley history, this museum features exhibit rooms decorated as they would appear in various time periods.

Experience a piece of living history at **Carnegie Hall,** where visitors find four art galleries, classes and live musical performances. Lewisburg is also home to the **Greenbrier Valley Theatre**, the State Professional Theatre of West Virginia.

Make sure to stop by Harmony Ridge Gallery, where a love of the handmade is at the heart of the art displayed. No artsy expedition to this area is complete without a stop at Tamarack Marketplace in nearby Beckley. This cultural center and market showcases more than 2,800 artisans from West Virginia.






ELKINS

Explore downtown's 50-plus galleries, restaurants and boutique shops in this city perched on the edge of Monongahela National Forest. Begin with **Artists at Work**—you'll quickly lose yourself among the paintings, woodwork, jewelry, fiber art and more featured in this co-op gallery.

If you leave inspired, head over to **The Arts Center** to try your hand at a variety of classes. Visit open studios as well as rotating exhibits throughout the year.

Learn more about the area at the nearby Beverly Heritage Center's museum and visitor center.

Ride your creative energy into the evening with a show at **Gandy Dancer Dinner Theatre.** Musical spectaculars pay tribute to the legendary artists of yesterday and today.



WHEELING The 250-year-old city has seen history float by on the Ohio River, resulting in a culture-rich heritage that continues today. Take an elegant red velvet seat in the Capitol Theatre's Beaux Artsinspired auditorium for live theater and music acts performing on the same stage that hosted luminaries like Johnny and June Carter Cash. Display your own talents during hands-on glassmaking workshops at the Oglebay Institute's Glass Museum, which houses more than 3,000 examples of vintage glass. The lighthearted side of culture takes center stage at the Kruger Street Toy and Train Museum. This museum teaches the story behind our favorite playthings, with toys on display from as far back as the early 1900s. You can play with almost anything, including vintage pinball machines and model train sets.

Q How did you and Chuck start performing together? A We met at the Mountain Stage NewSong Contest in Shepherdstown, where I was working as a stage manager and Chuck was a finalist in the emerging songwriter contest.

Q Were your signature harmonies there from the start?

A The way our voices blend was a big part of what drew us together right away. There was an immediate sound that happened when we started singing together that felt unlike anything either of us had felt singing before.

Q Where did the name The Sea The Sea come from?

A It's a cry of joy from Xenophon's Anabasis. A light at the end of the tunnel, a homecoming moment in the story. Making music together feels like all of those things.

Q The group did a version of "Country Roads." What does that song mean to you? A When you grow up a kid in West Virginia, that song is as much a part of you as anything. It's a song that makes me incredibly emotional in moments. There's a real sense of beauty and longing in that song for me—the ache of home and everything that can mean to you.

Keynote Pianist **DBOB THOMPSON**

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Bob grew up in New York City, learned jazz in West Virginia and later joined the Mountain Stage family.

Q How did you get started in music?

A Singing in choirs, playing the trumpet in school, and playing in drum and bugle corps.

Q How has West Virginia influenced you musically? A I was introduced to the jazz scene in the afterhours clubs in Charleston. I learned to play the blues, and I absorbed the feeling of the music. It was truly night school.

Q How did it feel to be inducted into the West Virginia Music Hall of Fame in 2015? I feel extremely honored, especially since I came to West Virginia from another state.

VENERATED VENUES

A tour of West Virginia's live music scene must include these celebrated stops.

THE LOUD

Huntington Formerly called the

V Club, this top regional music venue still brings its A game—as in The Avett Brothers, one of the big names who played here on their way up.

123 PLEASANT STREET Morgantown

Expect all types of artists and fans at this inclusive spot in a series of 1891 row houses converted to retail in the 1920s. Music bounces off exposed foundation walls and the pressed tin ceilings with "hanging" fireplaces.

POCAHONTAS COUNTY OPERA HOUSE Marlinton

Bluegrass, jazz and folk headline at this elegant 1910 venue on the National Register of Historic Places. It features a large stage and wraparound balcony.







PURPLE FIDDLE Thomas

Live Appalachian-based acoustic music every weekend and a familyfriendly atmosphere (kids and dancing welcome) create good vibes in the old DePollo General Store building.

CARNEGIE

One of only four Carnegie Halls in the world still used for performances, the 1902 building provides an intimate setting for concerts, whether it's the West Virginia Symphony Orchestra or jazzy Tuba Skinny.

CULTURE CENTER THEATER

Charleston Home to the legendary Mountain Stage music radio show, the sounds from this theater reach listeners across the country on NPR. Join the live audience on occasional Sunday nights.
